- WHEREAS, Article VI, Section 5 (b) of the Constitution of the Three Affiliated Tribes specifically authorizes and empowers the Tribal Business Council to administer any funds within the exclusive control of the Tribes to make expenditures from the available Tribal funds for public purposes of the Tribes; and
- **WHEREAS,** Because of Federal budget reductions, the NDSU Extension Service is one of the many programs that is included in this previous budget cut; and
- WHEREAS, The NDSU, due to the expansion of providing service to more segments and not having enough funding or manpower for these services, are requesting a monetary donation for assisting this much needed summer program for our youth.
- **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,** That the Tribal Business Council of the Three Affiliated Tribes does hereby authorize the donation of \$2,400.00 to the North Dakota State Extension Service Summer Youth Program.

The Extension Summer Program has been in existence in New Town since 1992. In 1994, the program expanded to the communities of Mandaree and White Shield. Each year, the number of participants increase. For example, in the summer of 1994, 1,369 youth participated; in 1995, the numbers increased to 1,459. This year our goal is to include Twin Buttes with yet another expansion in 1997 in the Parshall community.

Due to budget cuts our program has taken a drastic budget reduction. We cannot employ the number of employees that we have had in the past. Therefore, we are asking for your assistance by contributing \$2400.00 to employ one college age student to work for the program. This will give us the opportunity to reach the above mentioned communities and also provide experience for an individual pursuing a college degree. We have and will again take advantage of the JTPA Summer Youth Employment Program.

YOUTH PROGRAMMING

THE NEED:

Summer activities, such as baseball, swimming and basketball camps are held each summer for youth. As a result of a survey, it was found that not all youth participated in competitive sport programs. This brought about the Extension Summer Youth Program which provides experiential learning activities.

EXTENSION'S RESPONSE:

Each summer the Extension Summer Youth Program is made available by providing a series of week long activities for 6-8 weeks for school age kids. The program was funded by a grant and employs program assistants to supervise the activities. The initial focus of the program was social skills and later included science and math and now also includes agriculture and short term 4-H activities. The following are the activities offered during the summer of 1995.

Safety Week
Cultural Week
Agriculture Week
Bug and Wildlife Week
Environmental Week
Challenge of the Unknown (Math)
NASA Week
Aerospace Week

THE RESULTS:

- *The program has been in existence since 1992.
- *Due to high attendance and positive response from parents and community, the program has expanded to include two other communities.
- *Program assistants have returned to work two to three consecutive summers.
- *Have received additional assistance from the tribe to continue program.
- *Junior leaders have become more responsible individuals by acting as mentors.
- *The program provides hands on learning in math and science that is achievable for all participants.
- *More parents are volunteering for the program.
- *Other agencies and schools have collaborated efforts to make the program more successful.
