in 1938. The week the bundle was home the Northern Lights danced red, the color of the Thunder Bird relic inside the bundle. In the spring, the rain returned the grasslands green again.

Doosha West Segment! I would like to first give my condolence to the Tillie Walker Family, Ms. Walker is a great loss to Mandan Hidatsa, and Arikara Nation. February 9 has been proclaimed Tillie Fay Walker Day by the Mandare Hidatsa, and Arikara Tribal Council in her honor. Another great loss is one of our very own West Segment Staff members Mr. Christopher Fox. To the families of Evan Finley jr and if I missed any, that is not my intention.

West Segment Staff and Community had a very busy Christmas. This was one our biggest turn outs, everyone received something. Thank you to Enerplus for the nice meal and presents, also Crestwood! I want to thank my Staff for their outstanding job orchestrating our holidays festivities. We also had a tree lighting event with hay rides for the kids, thank you to my staff again for keeping our community involved in all of our events.

Another huge project by the West Segment Development Corporation (WSDC) occurring in Mandaree is the "Jump Zone" completion will be late May, just in time for summer break. This will be the first trampoline park on a North Dakota Reservation. WSDC will soon be having openings for employment and training for the Jump Zone. WSDC Jump Zone will have lower prices than the other trampoline parks in North Dakota.

The Elder's are on their way to Deadwood this month and in April the will be traveling to Shakopee before cabin fever sets in. The Hidatsa Elder's Program also distributed generators and heaters to those our elders who qualified for the priority list.

Planning is taking place in early summer to have the West Segment residences with-

out garages built. For residences unable to have a garage other options such as car ports could be available.

Progress on the Crestwood Mahgiddashda Center, the Head Start Building has also resumed.

The Water Buster Pow wow took place in January, which the Miri Baadi celebrated late into the evening. The celebration will resume back to the Water Chief Hall in 2019.

A Horse Track and grand stands will be built by the brand new On A Slant Arena Grounds this spring.

Also, I'm working to get all the roads paved in West Segment. Up next is BIA route 13, 10, and part of 17. The Mandaree School Bus Route.

The Mandaree Celebration War Bonnet Parade will be taking place here, at the Water Chief Hall in Mandaree on March 31. Mandaree Celebration committee members get your clan children prepared for this time and responsibility.

The flooring of the Water Chief Hall office area is also under construction, so please bear with our Young Bear Construction crew and the Water Chief Hall staff during this time. If you need assistance you can reach our Water Chief Hall Manager Adam Fredricks 897-1613.

I look forward to another year full of progress for the West Segment Community and for the Mandan Hidatsa, and Arikara Nation. Maacagiraac!

OVERVIEW OF EVENTS 2017

MANDAREE ELDERS PROGRAM

The Mandaree Elders Program is pleased to comply with the 2017 update on projects, services and social events that have transpired in the past year.

As part of our mission statement we provided social events which are comprised of trips to Minnesota at the Mystic Lake Casino and Resort where elders are provided with meals and social events in addition to shopping and bingo. We provided this trip in March 2017. In July we provided another trip to Deadwood SD where we toured the Black Hills and went to Crazy Horse Mountain.

Our mission statement also includes medical assistance for four categories which are eyeglasses, dental, vision and ramps. We have provided this service to assist elders who are sixty and older. In addition we have provided medical assistance for appointments to out of

town. We have worked on special projects in which we provided safety in the home and we provided fire extinguishers for elders. Also, working through a priority list for rural, health impaired, and living alone we provided generators FOR ELDERS ONLY 60 AND OLDER in the event of power outages. These special projects are provided through input from our Mandaree Hidatsa Elders Organizational Board which meets every second Wednesday of the Month.

Other social events have been Bingo for elderly during special occasions. We have started an annual Elder Appreciation Day on camping day of the Mandaree Powwow where we recognize elders who are 75 and older in which the Elder Program wishes to express our appreciation to our elders who have made significant contributions to our community and to the Hidatsa Tribe. We have made a traditional meal and presented them with a gift from the West Segment Community.

In collaboration with the Aging Services the West Segment Representative Office budget provides meal delivery vehicles and two drivers who have been diligently providing meals to elders who live in rural Mandaree and within the community. This has been our top priority to make sure that elders receive their meals.

The 2017 Miri Baadi pow wow committee lead the clan on celebrating with the community. They began with the Clan Bundle Keepers feed at the Nueta Hidatsa Sahnish College in New town Jan. 26. The clan members and pow wow committee bring dishes, except poultry. Eating poultry would be a disrespect to the deity of the bundle, the ThunderBird.

The next day, a pow wow started at the Water Chief Hall in Mandaree that welcomed about 50 dancers for Grand Entry and another feed for community. The dance began with the drum keeper, Donovan Likes Eagle offering tobacco by tossing it over the drum and striking it three times.

The position of the drum keeper never changes, along with the current bundle keeper Delvin Driver Sr. Until it is passed on through matrilineal ritual.

All dance categories had the chance to compete for monetary prize money. After the pow wow committee donated back to the community and called upon their selected successor.

The pow wow carried late into the evening and will be held at Water Chief Hall in 2018!

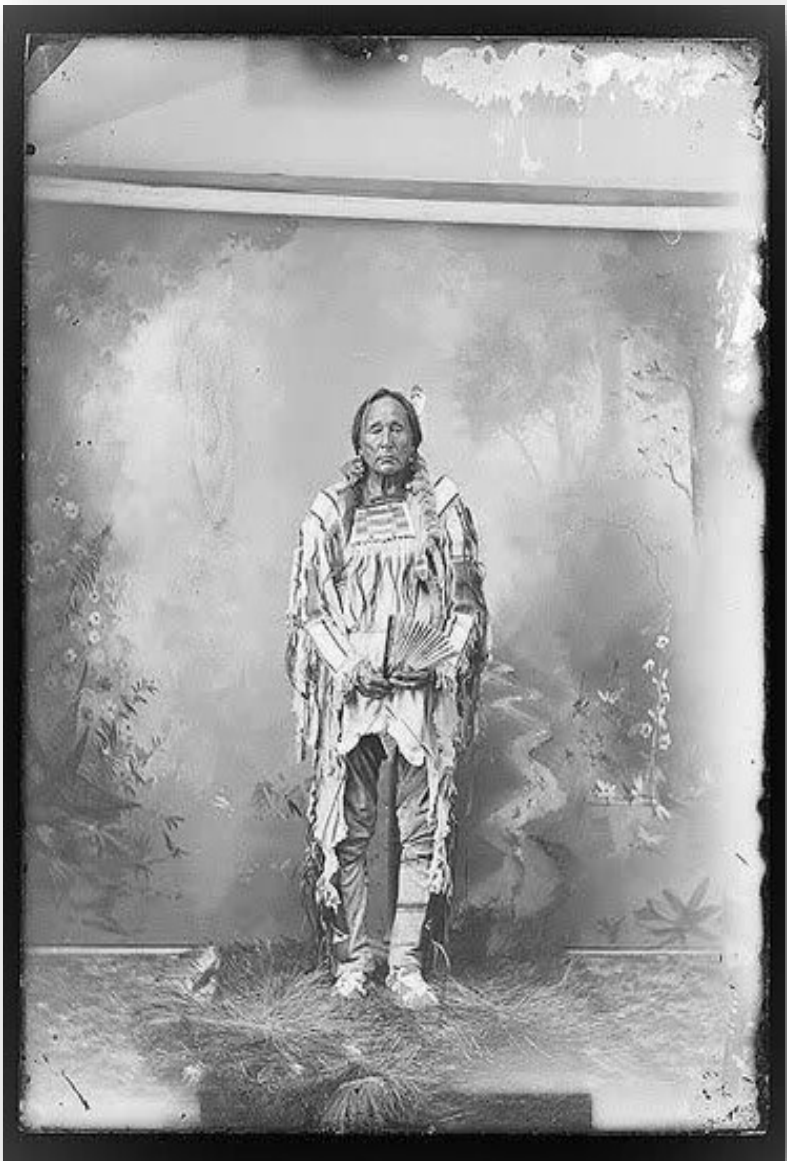

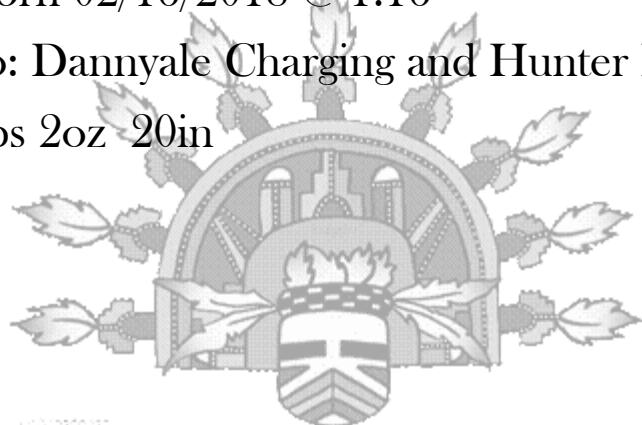

North Segment Grants Update



Date: February 20, 2018

Towards the end of 2017, North Segment submitted for two federally funded state grants, Opioid State Targeted Response (STR) and Alcohol and Other Drug Prevention (AOD). The STR grant is worth \$70,000 and the AOD grant is worth \$80,000, for a total of \$150,000. Shortly after submission, both grants were awarded to North Segment.

A small grants team has been created to carry out the mission of each grant. Our goal for the STR grant is to increase access to support services for those in recovery. Our goal for the AOD grant is to prevent alcohol and other drug use in the youth population. The current alcohol and drug crisis on our reservation affects us all. We will do our best create a safer and healthier North Segment community!

Housing Program Update

2017

Hello all you good readers of our Hidatsa Herald!!

This past year in our housing program saw the continued development of the White Oak Park project.

In early 2017 we had our first resident move into the park and we currently have 34 residents residing on Medicine Otter Loop.

Our mobile home park is named in honor of Tribal member and Veteran, Colin Bears Tail. He was a well-known Champion Grass Dancer from Fort Berthold, who along with his brothers Saunders Sr. and Tommy traveled the region winning many contests. Colin once told me years ago, "They knew when I and my brothers were in town," as in they knew we came to dance! In the late 1990's Colin moved to White Oak, Maryland and started a drum group that he called, "White Oak Singers" for the town he lived in. This drum group was the host drum for the Grand Opening of the Smithsonian National Museum of the American Indian. The street in the mobile park is named "Medicine Otter" Loop which was his Indian Name.

The housing program is continuing to work with the West Segment Development Board to install our Solar Street Lights, Street Signage, and gutters to improve the drainage.

The White Oak project was an effort of our Councilman Mr. Randy Phelan who realized the continued need for housing for our community.

As of this edition the White Oak Park is full and we anticipate by summer 2018 to offer 3 more units.

One thing that I would like to inform the community is that the Hidatsa Housing Program is not affiliated with the other housing programs on the reservation like the Fort Berthold Housing Program (Federal Low/No Income) and the Tribal Housing Programs (Tribal/Federal). We know this can be confusing at times for the community members.

Our local Hidatsa Housing Program only owns and manages the "new" homes purchased during the last 5 years. The many unoccupied homes in the segment our more

than likely Fort Berthold Housing Program homes. They have federal restrictions on the home and home site least with the tribe that do not allow our local program to renovate them.

During our Cold Spells of Frigid weather that we experience seasonally, we asked all of our tenants to please leave your kitchen sink "COLD WATER" on as to prevent your pipes from freezing. This is particularly important for our White Oak Park residents.

The Hidatsa Housing Program staff along with our Board of Directors and Councilman Phelan will continue to explore additional affordable housing options in the future.

One consideration we have discussed infirmly has been the development of a multi-family units like an Apartment building and or Duplex homes. These considerations are tied to future Tribal Funding as related to Oil and Gas revenues and we have no time frame on this potential project.

Finally we would like all applicants to know that they must be proactive and inform our staff of any job changes, phone numbers, and or address updates. Since we do not keep "Lists" as all Applicants receive the same consideration regardless of the time they apply. We also only work with "fully completed" applications which means we have all your documents.

At this time we will still accept applications but have no availability.

The staff and I all live in the community and please don't hesitate to stop me and ask any questions.

Our office is located at the Old MEC Building on top of the Hill. Please use the Westside Door by the garage.

That is equivalent to the size of just two grains of sand. This is what makes it so popular for drug suppliers to use – just the tiniest amount can increase the potency of a drug, keeping their margins profitable and their customers satisfied.

The danger of fentanyl isn't just to users – It can be a threat to anyone who knowingly or unknowingly come into contact with it.

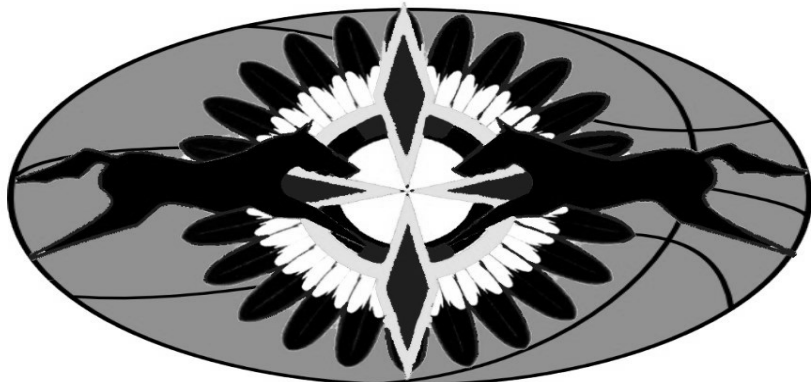

Christine Burr, 90, New Town, died Tuesday, February 13, 2018 at her home. Christine Burr was born August 16, 1927 at home near the Independence Community. She was the first-born child of Oscar Burr and Mary Wounded Face Burr. She was a member of the Prairie Chicken Clan and a child of the Flint Knife Clan.

She grew up on the river bottom near Independence until the building of the Garrison Dam after which the family moved northeast of the Lost Bridge area south of Mandaree. She and her siblings grew up riding horses and swimming in the Missouri River among the cottonwoods. She told stories of Christmas's where they would hook up a team and buckboard and go to Waterchief Hall and someone would come in ringing a bell dressed like Santa Claus and give gifts to the children. She told stories of saddling up a horse and swimming it across the big Missouri to Elbowoods and coming home with a gunny-sack of canned milk for her daughter. She was one of the last of her generation who lived to remember the days of kerosene lamps, traveling by buckboard and team and outhouses.

She became an avid beader and made many beautiful star quilts in her time. She taught her daughters these skills and if they needed extra money she would tell them to use their beading and sewing skills to make extra money.

She lived many years in the Watford City area with her late husband AV Christianson until his death in 1991. There she was a ranch wife making lunches for round-ups, branding cattle, tending to gardens, canning vegetables, even driving a tractor when necessary, attending rodeos and living the ranch life. She loved listening to country gospel music, country western

songs and listened to TBN 24/7. She loved her Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and her last days were spent listening to Church on TV.

Our beloved Mom and Grandma passed away peacefully at her son's home, which was her wish. She told us she was ready to see the Lord and missed her loved ones that went before her. She lived to be 90 years old, a very strong Mandan Hidatsa woman.

Christine is survived by her children, Norma Jean Grady (Roger Sr), Joan Mann (Adrian Jr.), Gilbert Mann Jr., Lila Wells (Bill), and Claude Christianson (Janelle) of New Town, Kathy Mann (Bruce) of Mandaree, and Denise Helms (Rob) of Ft. Worth, TX; her sister, Virginia Rachel Grady and brother, Harold Burr.

She raised one granddaughter Krystal Bird but left her mark in the world as she was grandmother to thirty grandchildren, forty great-grandchildren, and eleven great-great-grandchildren for a total of 81 grandchildren!

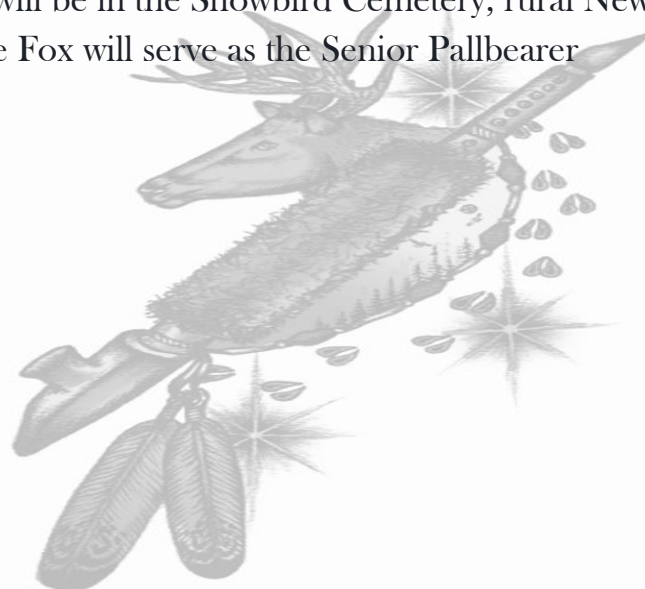

Tom was so proud to be a father. He was always showing his girls off. He enjoyed going for drives and playing with them. Tom's girls meant the world to him. They all shared a special bond and had a special place in his heart.

Tom lived in Bismarck for a few years and returned home, where he lived until the time of his passing. Tom lived with his mother as she became ill and took care of her. Once she got better, they enjoyed traveling all over, going out to eat and going to the casino. They were always doing something or going some-

where.

Tom enjoyed golfing, watching football and basketball and hanging out with his friends and family. He always enjoyed company over at the house. He had a great sense of humor and loved to Joke around. Tom was always lending a hand where he could; shoveling driveways or just helping friends and family out. He had a kind and gentle soul and was a great friend to many.

Over the years, he gained the title "grandfather" as he was blessed with 3 grandchildren; Kayleigh Marie, John Thomas and Rubyann Sage.

Tillie Fay Walker, age 88 of Mandaree, ND, passed away on Saturday, February 3, 2018 at Sanford Health, Bismarck, ND. Her funeral arrangements are with Fulkerson Stevenson Funeral Home of Watford City.

Tillie Faye Walker, named Hishua Adesh (Blossoming Mint), was born at home in the Independence community on the Fort Berthold Indian Reservation on July 11, 1928. Tillie was born a member of the Ma'xohxadi or Alkalai Lodge clan, and was a child of the Apuhga Wigaa or Low Cap Clan. Tillie's mother, Mercy Baker Walker was the daughter of Louis Baker and Emma Taylor, but was raised by her grandmother First Sprout and grandfather Two Chief. Her father Hans Walker Sr. was the son of Joseph and Susie Walker Youngbird, who were both Hidatsa from the Lucky Mound community.

Tillie and her siblings grew up in a world centered on traditional Mandan and Hidatsa values and culture, a bi- and tri-lingual world where most community members spoke or could communicate in English, Hidatsa, and Mandan. They lived in a log house built by their father, and ate the delicious food their mother prepared from her extensive gardens. Both parents enjoyed visiting their extended family, and made sure their children knew their relatives and the traditional values embedded in those relationship norms – from respect and dedication to helping your family, to teasing.

Tillie began her education in the local Independence school, and moved to the mission school in Elbowoods when she was a few years older. She finished her high school degree at Sanish High School, then continued on to work toward her postsecondary degree at Haskell and Willamette University before finishing her BA in Business Administration at the University of Nebraska. This was a time period in which it was unusual for tribal members to complete a college degree, especially so for women. Tillie's father wanted his daughters to have the same opportunities his sons did – this in an era in which educational opportunities were constrained for women, and when many believed that women would not benefit from or use a higher education degree.

While in college she constantly worked to help fund her education, from driving a pea truck to working for the Nebraska Legislature. After graduation, Tillie and two of her friends took a train to Philadelphia – without a job or a place lined up to live – and she approached the American Friends Service Committee and asked for a job. They hired her on the spot, and eventually that position led to the creation of the United Scholarship Service, an organization conceptualized, organized, and driven by Tillie that brought promising Native youth to fully funded slots in elite private boarding schools. She recruited students from all over Indian Country, and many national and community leaders and activists who came of age during the 1960s and 70s were those she had identified, cultivated, and supported during their studies through her organization – or who she had employed as staff.

“She was incredibly independent, even when we were little,” her sister Reba recalls. This independence, her energy and hardworking nature cultivated by her parents, and her natural charisma and sense of fun made her a force to be reckoned with. She mentored and was a role model to many of the original red power activists involved in the National Indian Youth Council,

including Clyde Warrior, Mel Thom, and Hank Adams. Tillie and others began to question the status quo power structures of how federal power was exerted on tribal lands, from staffing of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, to land use rights, to issues of leasing and resource extraction.

Her work on the national level caught the attention of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. as he began to organize for the Poor People's Campaign, and she met him shortly before his assassination when he brought her into the campaign organizing. Tillie served as one of the key Native organizers for the campaign, and recruited tribal members and leaders from across the country to participate. She made sure to include elders such as George Crow Flies High and Mattie Grinnell, who made the trip to Washington, DC to participate in the marches, sit ins, and testimonies as part of the Campaign. She also gave fiery and memorable testimony to the Secretary of the Interior and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs during the Campaign, as detailed in several academic histories of red power activism. Through these decades of work on the national scene, Tillie influenced the very direction of activism and federal Indian policy. She considered the implementation of Indian Preference hiring in Indian Health Service and the Bureau of Indian Affairs to be her biggest professional accomplishment.

Those guided and mentored by her remember her as a mixture of being highly educated and very traditional, during a time period in which many saw those qualities as in conflict. She lived and worked off-reservation in Denver, but she had a constant stream of older and younger relatives and friends visiting her. They remember that almost her entire record collection was powwow music, and that she always had corn in various stages of drying in her apartment. Her family remembers that she had knowledge of traditional medicines – likely cultivated in her by her mother Mercy, who held a traditional medicine bundle and helped care for the Lone Man Shrine – and would tell her niece and nephews bedtime stories that included traditional origins stories.

After Tillie's mother Mercy suffered a stroke, she eventually moved back to Fort Berthold to help take care of her mom. She moved back to her family's house in what remained of the Independence district (vastly changed due to the land loss associated with the Garrison Dam), near Mandaree. She helped her mom and continued her extensive gardens, and ran for and won a tribal council seat in the 1980s. While on council she worked on the Garrison Unit Joint Tribal Advisory Committee (JTAC), that advocated for a fuller accounting of and compensation for the land taking associated with the Garrison Dam. The work she and others did secured an additional \$143M in federal compensation for the eminent domain taking of the heart of the Fort Berthold land base.

After retiring, Tillie continued to work for her tribal community. She enjoyed visiting, organizing, and rabble rousing with her close friends Celeste Witham, Rosemarie Mandan, Wanda Fox, and Phyllis Cross. She picked and preserved juneberries and bullberries, made beautiful star quilts, and never missed Mandaree Powwow. She had a longstanding love affair with chocolate (especially Godiva chocolate) and enjoyed watching the Letterman Show, often closing her evening with “Mudakua” and a crossword puzzle. She was a role model, a confidante, a supporter, and a mentor to many of her lucky nieces, nephews, and grandchildren.

Tillie lived in the country outside Mandaree for decades, in the house her parents built during the relocation process due to the Garrison Dam flooding. When her mobility required her to be closer to services, she lived in New Town for several years, and eventually settled in Bismarck to be close to her younger sister Reba. In 2014 Tillie and Reba bought and donated lands associated with a historical Hidatsa village site to the Three Affiliated Tribes. Tillie gave a substantial donation to the Three Affiliated Tribes Museum, with no strings attached to how the money would be spent. In 2016 Tillie was successful in her two-decade effort to have the Independence Congregational Church designated as a historic place on the National Register of Historic Places. Despite her accomplishments and substantial service to her tribe and Indian Country, she never talked about herself and all the work she did – a reflection of the traditional values modeled by her parents. Although affected by Alzheimer's, Tillie remained true to her character – independent, fun-loving, and generous to her relatives to the last of her days.

Tillie passed away on February 3, 2018, and is survived by her younger sister, Reba Walker, niece Leah Ann Walker, and nephews Tom Walker, Carrey Walker, and Reid Walker. She was preceded in death by her father Hans Walker, Sr., her mother Mercy Baker Walker, and her two brothers Melvin Walker and Hans Walker, Jr. Everyone who was lucky enough to know Tillie will miss the light and generosity she brought to our lives

Chris married Pamela Nadeau on August 27, 2016. The union of their marriage brought the community together. Their vows were exchanged outside their home.

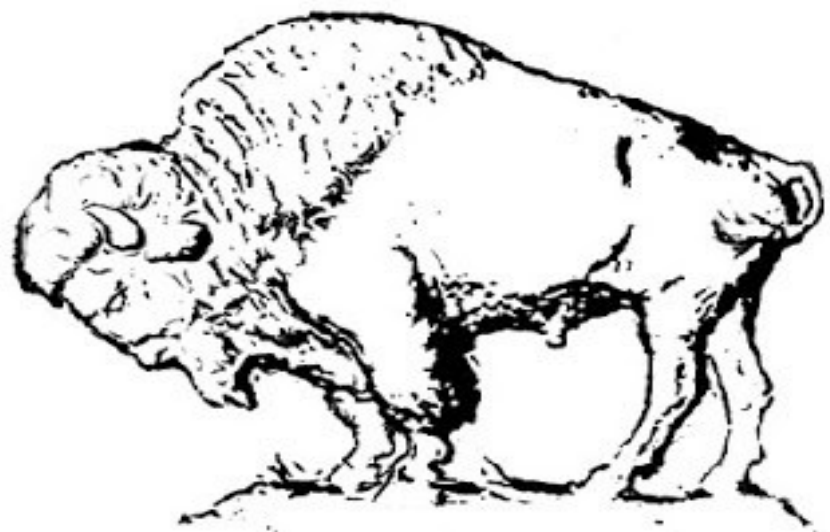

On the early morning hours of Thursday, January 25, 2018, New Town Police Officer Darren Carter conducted a traffic stop on an out of state vehicle here in New Town. The driver, identified as Jorge Pitts, was the lone occupant. Officer Carter detected the odor of marijuana emanating from the vehicle and deployed his K9. MHA Drug Enforcement was requested for assistance and a Drug Enforcement Agent was deployed to assist Officer Carter. Pitts was subsequently arrested for possession of a controlled substance and the vehicle impounded. U.S. Homeland Security Investigation (HSI) Agent along with MHA Drug Enforcement sought and obtained a federal search warrant for the vehicle.

The search warrant was executed upon the vehicle. MHA Drug Enforcement recovered a loaded semi-automatic handgun and in excess of 1,600 Oxycodone pills. The street value for those pills, if sold on Fort Berthold, was in excess of \$115,000.

Due to the vigilance of the New Town Police Department and their partnership with MHA Drug Enforcement these pills, which were destined for distribution in our community, were intercepted. The daily battle to impede the flow of illicit drugs to Fort Berthold continues.

This seizure is a prime example of the major efforts MHA Drug Enforcement's battle against the opioids that plague our communities here on Fort Berthold. This case also exemplifies the working relationships MHA Drug Enforcement maintains with the New Town Police Department, Homeland Security Investigations, Three Affiliated Tribes Police Department and other agencies. This case is just one of many that MHA Drug Enforcement continues in taking the lead.
