Winter Safety Tips for Older Adults

Conditions and Warning Signs:

Hypothermia:

Hypothermia occurs when your body temperature drops to a dangerous level. Your body can drop when you are out in the cold for an extended time because it begins to lose heat quickly. Older adults are at an increased risk of hypothermia due to changes that happen to your body with aging.

Warning Signs:

- Cold skin that is pale or ashy
- Feeling very tired, confused and sleepy
- Feeling weak
- Problems walking
- Slowed breathing or heart rate.

Note: shivering is not a reliable warning sign because older people tend to shiver less or not at all when their body temperature drops.

- Stay indoors (or don't stay outside for very long)
- Keep indoor temperature at 65 degrees or warmer.
- Stay dry because wet clothing chills your body more quickly.
- Dress smart protect your lungs from cold air.
- Layer up! Wearing 2 or 3 thinner layers of loose-fitting clothing is warmer than a single layer of thick clothing. Think about getting your thermals!
- Essential winter wears; hats, gloves or preferably mittens, winter coat, boots and scarf to cover your mouth and nose.

Call 911 if you think you or someone else is experiencing hypothermia

Frostbite:

Frostbite occurs when your body experiences damage to the skin that can go all the way down to the bone. Not surprisingly, extreme cold can cause frostbite. It is most likely to occur on body parts farthest away from your heart. Common places include your nose, ears, cheeks, chin, fingers and toes. In severe cases, frostbite can result in loss of limbs. People with heart disease and other circulation problems are at higher risk.

Warning Signs:

- Skin that's white or ashy or grayish yellow
- Skin feels hard or waxy
- Numbness

Precautions to Take:

- Cover Up! All parts of your body should be covered when you go out in the cold.
- If skin turns red or dark or starts hurting get inside right away.
- If frostbite has happened.
- Run the affected area under warm (not hot) water.

Call for medical help if you think you or someone else has frostbite.

Falls:

- Make sure steps and walkways are clear before you walk. Be especially careful if you see wet pavements that could be iced over.
- Clear away snow and salt your walkways at home, or hire someone to do it.
- Wear boots with non-skid soles-this will prevent you from slipping.
- If you use a cane, replace the rubber tip before it is worn smooth.
- Consider an ice pick like attachment that fits onto the end of the cane for additional traction.

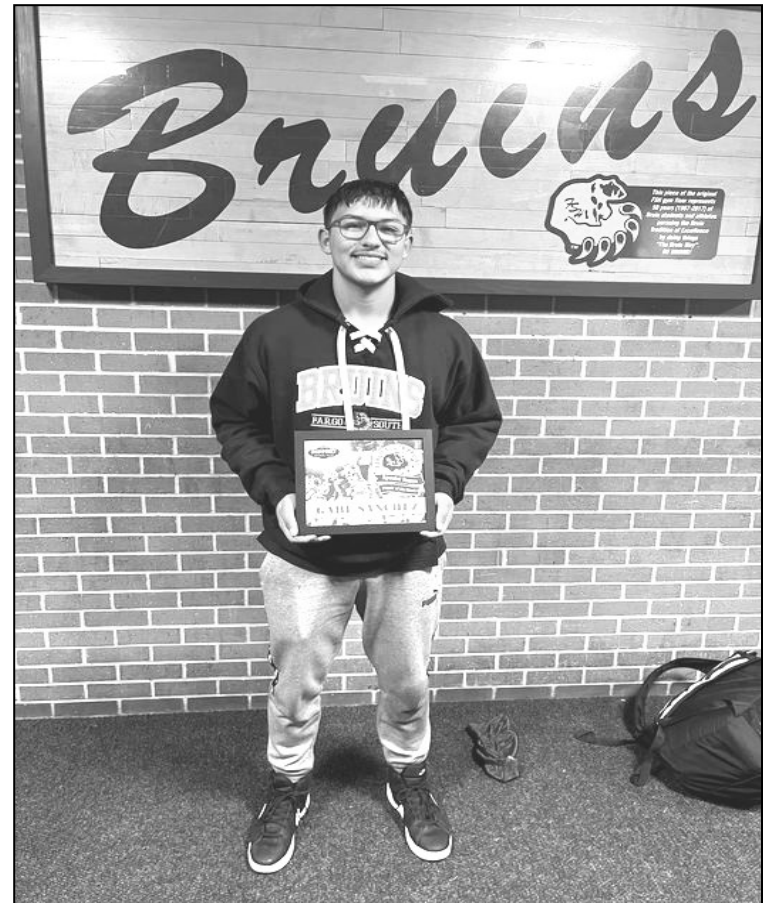

West Segment Veterans Dance

Veterans Day is celebrated in all our communities honoring service members. In part of the celebration each community invites local drum groups to come and sing so our community members can dance in celebration. Also for those who wish to have their personal song rendered by their selected drum group. I remember my aunt Wanda Sheppard telling me when we do something on our reservation it is always best to use our drum groups. These drum groups are a vital part of our culture in any celebration that we have here in each of our communities. I thought it would be interesting to let everyone know the history of Veterans Day.

In 1968, Congress signed the Uniform Holiday Bill to ensure that a handful of federal holidays including Veterans Day would be celebrated hoping this decision would spur travel and family activities over a long weekend and stimulate the economy, according to the Department of Defense.

Under this bill, Veterans Day was set to be celebrated on the fourth Monday of every October, with the first Veterans Day under the new bill being held on October 25, 1971.

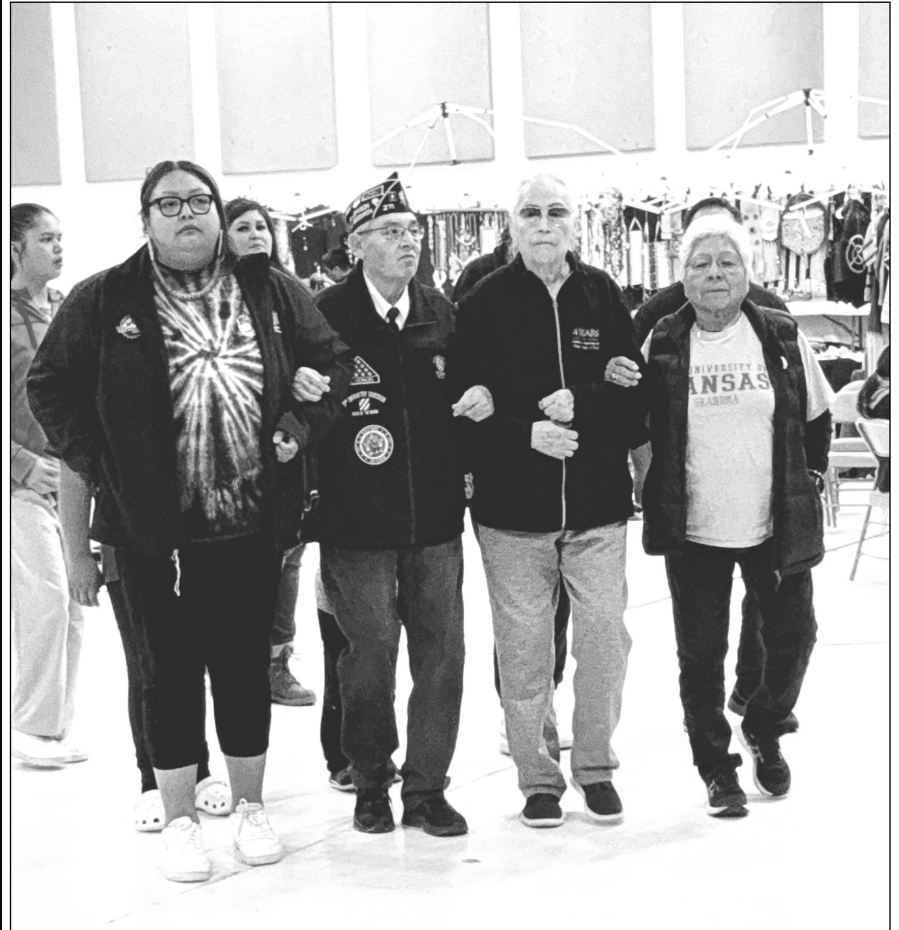
Most citizens were confused and unhappy about the change in dates, and many chose to continue celebrating Veterans Day on November 11. After a few years of contention with the October holiday, former President Gerald Ford signed another law into effect on September 20, 1975, that returned Veterans Day to its original November 11 observance, starting in 1978.

All communities within the Fort Berthold Reservation boundaries gathered at different times to honor the Veterans. Some families honor their Veterans during the celebration and usually a personal song or Veterans song is rendered so the ones honoring a veteran will dance with their family.

West Segment community had their Veterans dance recently and had veterans honored at that time. Councilwoman Gladys Sherry Turner-Lone Fight honored her husband who is a Veteran with a give away and a Veterans dance special. (pg. 16 for winners)

Others honored Veterans were; Mary Gachupin honored her good friend Ethel Baker Reeves, Preston Danks was honored. Colleen honored her aunts Lujuanna Young Bird and Glenda Good Bird. So as each community takes the time and effort to honor our veterans which is an honor for family and relatives. We remember if it wasn't for these veterans we wouldn't have our freedom.

He has also found additional information to discount the Ft Manuel story that says Sacagawea died there in 1812. The work on the Sacagawea book started in the Mandaree community in 2015 when we held a Sacagawea/Cherry Necklace Summit. The Sacagawea board members and authors of the book are Gerard Baker, Carol Newman, Calvin Grinnell, Bernie Fox and Wanda Sheppard. It is titled, Our Story of Eagle Woman, Sacagawea: They Got It Wrong.

Sandra and I have been enjoying the West Segment newspaper. The paper keeps us up on the people and happenings in the Mandaree area and some of the plans for further development there. The changes in the community are unbelievable. We remember when Mandaree was just an elementary school and the housing was for only employees of the school.

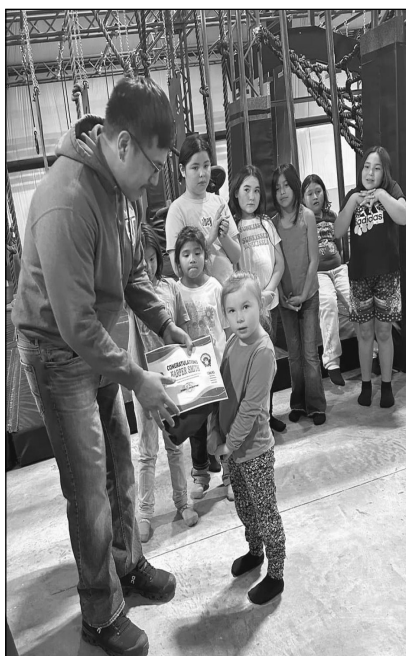

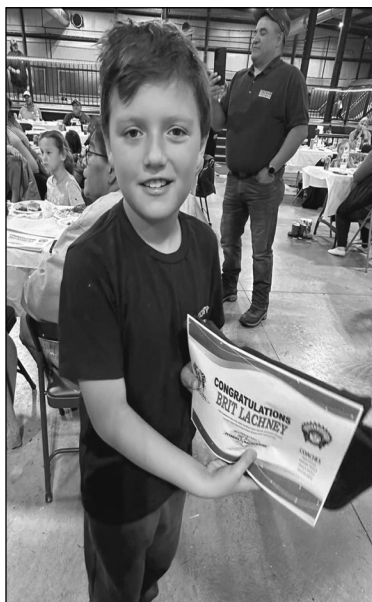

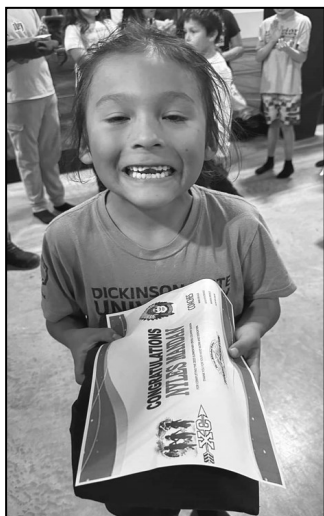

From District 4A Representative Lisa DeVille



During 68th Legislative Assembly of ND Special Session I introduced and proposed an amendment 23.1164.01001 to HB 1544 Workforce grant for all ND tribal colleges in the Joint Appropriations committee. HB 1544, Statement of Purpose of Amendment, "This amendment increases the \$500,000 general fund appropriation for workforce development grants to tribally controlled community colleges to \$2.5 million and requires the Department of Commerce to provide \$500,000 to each tribally controlled community college in the state rather than providing \$500,000 only to a tribally controlled community college in the Turtle

Mountain area." A copy of the ND Tribal College System CTE proposal was given to this joint committee.

There was much discussion but it did fail. It is my understanding that the focus was not to add additional funding only focusing on existing bills. The joint committee did say next session will look at. Thank you to Dr. Twyla Baker president of NHSC for submitting written comment, Dr. Brown president of Turtle Mt College for being present and giving verbal support, Representative Davis, Senator Mathern who helped me introduce this amendment and helped push it, and the house and senators who voted for my amendment to HB 1544.

History, this past 68th Legislative Assembly of ND Turtle Mt College is the only tribal college to receive workforce grant in the amount of \$500,000.

Below is my verbal and written testimony.

Good afternoon. My name is representative Lisa Finley-DeVille. I represent district 4A, Ft. Berthold Reservation.

I am honored to address you today in support of a workforce grant for North Dakota's Tribal Colleges and the vital role they play in empowering individuals, fostering economic growth, and enhancing the overall well-being of our communities. North Dakota is home to 5 tribal nations. Each offer low-cost secondary education at local accredited institutions for their communities. These grants serve as a crucial investment in our future, and I would like to highlight several reasons why their continued funding is essential.

1. Skill Development and Employability: Workforce grants enable our citizens to gain access to training and education programs that enhance their skills and employability. These grants open doors for individuals to learn new trades, improve existing skills, and stay competitive in the evolving job market.

2. Job Creation and Economic Growth: By supporting workforce development for NHSC, we can create even more opportunities for a skilled workforce that is attractive to local businesses and growing industries in our region.

3. Meeting Industry Demand: Investment in tribal colleges through workforce development grants can be tailored to address the specific needs of local industries. They ensure that individuals receive training that directly aligns with the skills and qualifications required by employers, making the labor force more adaptable and responsive to market demands.

4. Closing the Skills Gap: The workforce landscape is constantly changing, and the skills gap is a persistent challenge. Workforce grants play a vital role in closing this gap by funding education and training programs that target in-demand skills, helping us keep pace with technological advancements.

5. Community Resilience: A well-skilled workforce is better prepared to adapt to economic shocks and recover from downturns. By investing in workforce development, we foster a more resilient and prosperous community. Tribal colleges often collaborate with the North Dakota University System to enhance students' academic experience, retention, persistence and seamless transfer.

6. Public institutions: Tribal colleges are affordable and accessible to Native and non-Native students alike.

7. Growth of economic contributions: In 2019, tribal colleges contributed over \$145 million to North Dakota's economy according to the 2020 Economic Modeling Specialists International North Dakota's Tribal colleges would greatly benefit from the workforce grants are not merely investments in education and training; they are investments in the people who make up our community and the economic prosperity of our region. I urge you to continue your support for these grants, recognizing their profound impact on our citizens' lives, our local businesses, and the overall vitality of our community.

On a personal note. I received my higher education on Ft. Berthold Reservation. I received my Associate of Arts and Associate of Sciences, Bachelor, and my Masters degrees from NHSC. Three of my children graduated from ND tribal colleges with one more soon to graduate from NHSC. My youngest is anticipating attending UTTC. We chose to continue our education at home where tribal colleges are more affordable with low-cost tuition and culturally relevant curriculum.

Thank you. I stand for questions.

*Update

On 10-24-23 my proposal amendment 23.2164.01001 to HB 1544 Workforce grant for all ND tribal colleges failed in House.

10-25-23 amendment failed in senate.

I want to reaffirm my commitment to advocating for essential legislative issues that directly impact the lives of North Dakota's Native American people. With a shared vision of progress and commitment I will continue to work diligently to address pressing concerns and improve the overall well-being of all our Tribal Nations.

68th Legislative Assembly of ND Special Session

HB 1546, Relating to the clean sustainable energy authority's fertilizer development incentive program; to provide for retroactive application; and to provide an effective date was voted on by House, passed 60 yes and 30 no. Although ND state is number one in many crops in the world. I voted no because of environmental impacts fertilizer has on the water and land and our food. Our water is being transported to the eastern ND. In research the Red River in eastern ND is contaminated from agriculture run off. I was told that is not the reason why our water is being transported to eastern ND.

On 10-23-23 HB 1546 was passed in joint committee.
Today 10-25-23 HB 1546 was voted passed, 40 yes and 7 no.

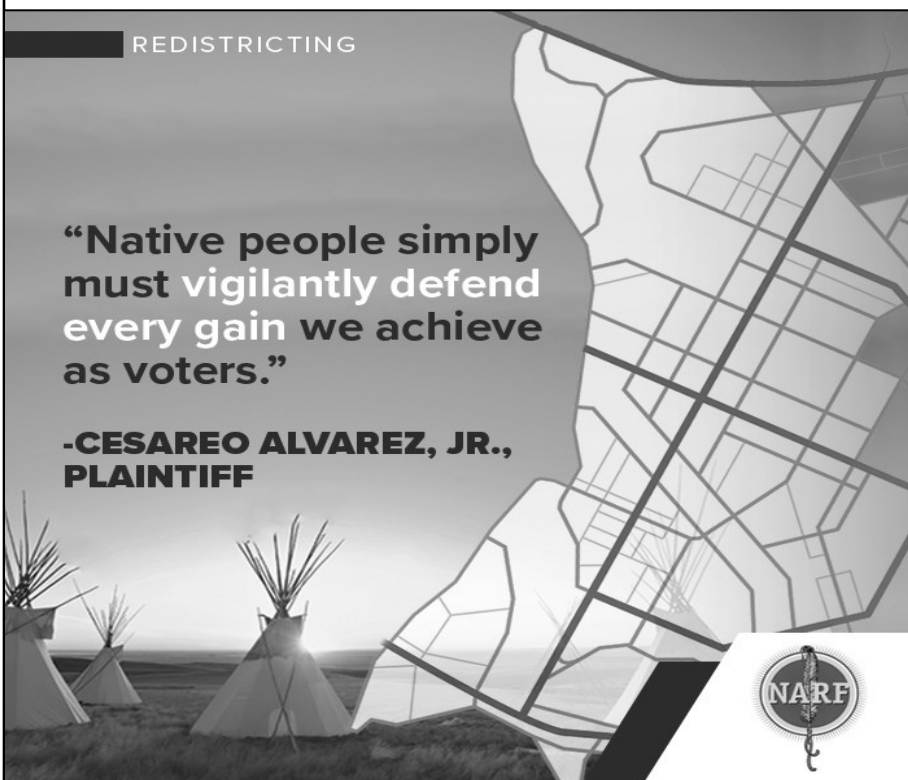

National Caucus of Native American State Legislators (NCNASL)

On November 9-10, 2023 I attended the 2023 Annual Meeting of the National Caucus of Native American State Legislators in Denver CO. Hosted by the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL). This “annual meeting brings together state legislators to exchange, learn and build state policy resolutions that improve state-tribal relationships and improve Native American communities”.

The first day we met with Colorado Commission of Indian Affairs, Building Government to Government Relationships: Discussion on State-Tribal Engagement Efforts. In the afternoon we had a site visit at Centers for American Indian and Alaska Native Health, location Nighthorse Campbell Native Health Building where we were giving presentation and networked on Diabetes Prevention, Behavioral Health, and Medical Reimbursement for Traditional Medicine with their staff. We also toured the beautiful building.

The second day we met at the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL) building where Native American Rights Fund (NARF) gave an update on Native American Voting Efforts, Indian Child Welfare Act, and Boarding Schools. Next NCSL Department of Energy (DOE) gave updates. Lastly NCNASL held our business meeting where we discussed priorities and elected Executive Committee (2023-2025).

There are 90 Native American legislators in the U.S. I am excited to be a member of the National Caucus of Native American State Legislators (NCNASL).

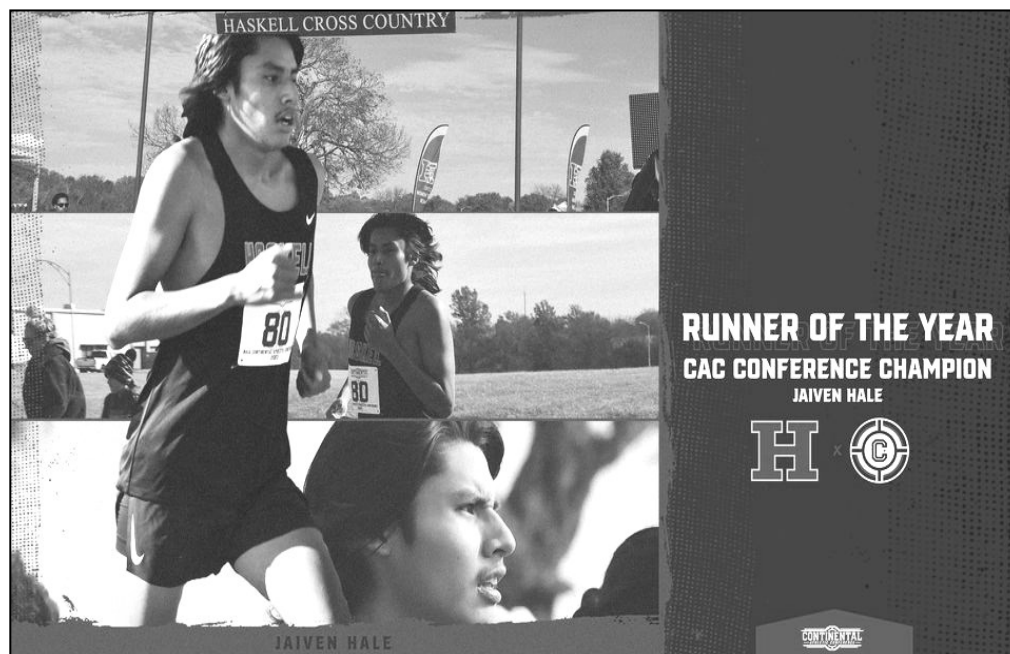

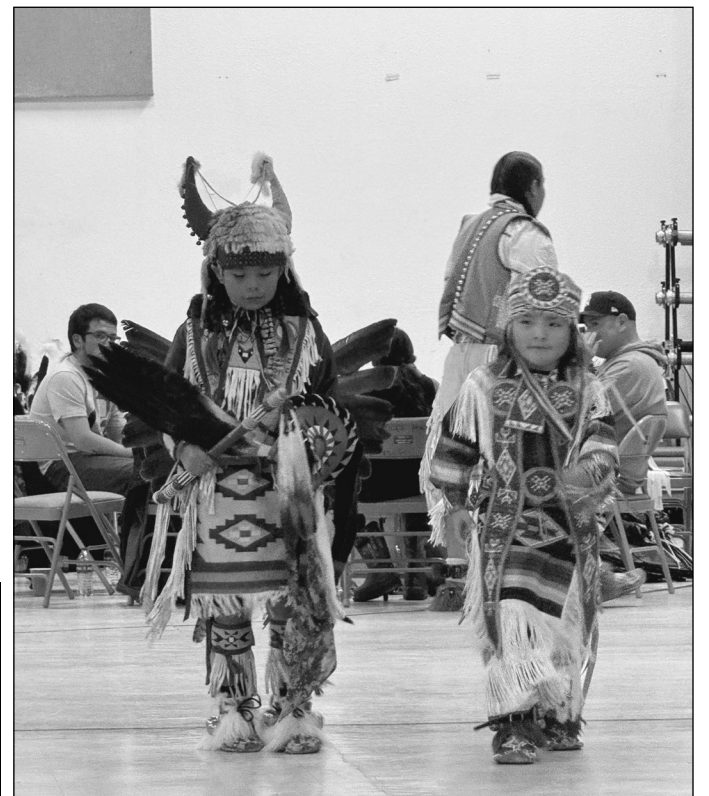

I Stand in Support of Crucial Legislative Issues

Bismarck, North Dakota – Last week, North Dakota Legislative Assembly convened in a Special Session to address the appropriation of funding on various projects. I introduced and proposed an amendment to HB 1544, the Workforce Grant appropriation bill to include all North Dakota tribal colleges to receive funding through the Joint Appropriations committee.

HB 1544, Statement of Purpose of Amendment, “This amendment increases the \$500,000 general fund appropriation for workforce development grants to tribally controlled community colleges to \$2.5 million and requires the Department of Commerce to provide \$500,000 to each tribally controlled community college in the state rather than providing \$500,000 only to a tribally controlled community college in the Turtle Mountain area.” A copy of the ND Tribal College System CTE proposal was given to this joint committee. Only one of the state’s five tribally controlled colleges currently benefit from the Workforce Grant.

There was much discussion on how this bill would benefit all of our tribal colleges, unfortunately, it did fail. It is my understanding that the purpose of this special legislative session was to focus on funding passed from previous existing bills from the regular session, not to add additional funding for projects that have been overlooked. The Joint Committee did promise to reconsider funding all tribal colleges in the next session in 2025.

Thank you to Dr. Twyla Baker president of NHSC for submitting written comment, Dr. Brown president of Turtle Mt College for being present and giving support, Representative Jayme Davis, Senator Mathern who helped me introduce and support this amendment, and to the House Representatives and Senators who voted for my amendment to HB 1544.

Here are the other bills that went through at the 2023 Special Legislative Session:

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 4021, a concurrent resolution affirming support and unwavering commitment to the welfare, security, and survival of the State of Israel was passed in the House 86 yes and 6 no. On 10-24-23 it was passed in the Senate. On 10-23-23 SCR 4021 was passed in the Joint Committee meeting. I voted no. We should be calling for peace and not choosing sides.

Senate Bill 2396 Relating to a special penalty for death or injury through distribution of illegal drugs; to provide a penalty; and to provide an effective date was voted on in the House and passed. This is an important bill for me because our communities face so many deaths from illegal drugs and

someone needs to be held accountable. On 10-24-23 Policy Joint Committees voted a do pass. On 10-24-23 Senate voted on 47 yes and 0 no.

HB 1546, Relating to the clean sustainable energy authority’s fertilizer development incentive program; to provide for retroactive application; and to provide an effective date was voted on and passed 60 yes and 30 no. Although North Dakota is the number one producer of many crops, I voted no because of potential environmental impacts that fertilizer has on the water, land, and food. In the regular session it was decided that our water from will be transported to eastern North Dakota. In my research, the Red River in eastern ND is contaminated from agricultural runoff (contamination), yet I was told that is not the reason why our water is being transported. On 10-25-23 the HB 1546 was voted passed, 40 yes and 7 no.

I want to reaffirm my commitment to advocating for essential legislative issues that directly impact the lives of North Dakota’s Native American people. With a shared vision of progress and commitment I will continue to work diligently to address pressing concerns and improve the overall well-being of all our Tribal Nations.

Representative Lisa Finley-DeVille, District 4A

My name is Representative Lisa Finley-DeVille, and I have represented District 4A in North Dakota since 2023.

I proudly voted against both book banning bills this session. I think North Dakota libraries did a great job this session, especially the Minot Public Library, in communicating the importance of libraries and the love they have for their communities and for free information. I believe in libraries. When I was growing up, they were where I turned to for a lot of information. I live on the Fort Berthold reservation, and at that time I didn’t have much knowledge about the outside world. So, I would read from newspapers and books at the library, and I learned a lot.

I fear people don’t want to know our history. Next will they try and erase the history of who I am? I am Native American. I am a member of the Mandan Hidatsa Arikara Nation, a descendent of the Mandan and Hidatsa. I don’t want my tribe or any tribe erased from history. I don’t want a very vocal and radical group to dictate our story. That’s what I feel these book bans will do. Please join me in keeping our libraries free from censorship.
