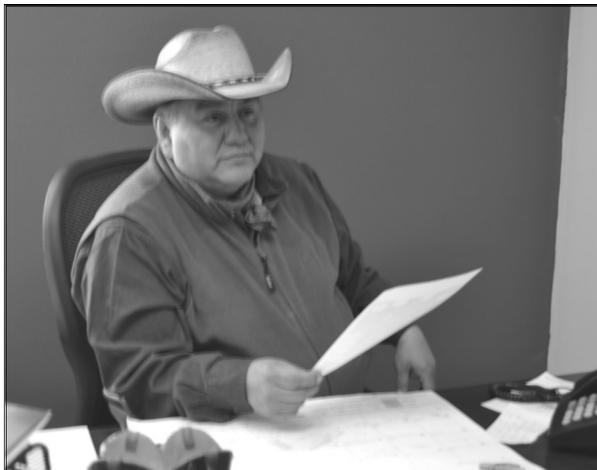

## West Segment Tribal Representative Update



Hello Community members and relatives. I welcome everyone and our visitors to our 2013 Mandaree Celebration! May you enjoy our hospitality and our generosity.

Now that summer is here I know that

many of us are traveling to celebrations throughout Indian country. A reminder to everyone to drive safe and defensively because we have so much road construction in every direction that you travel.

As you are all aware we recently had The 2013 Heart Beat of The Bakken Days was held on two days, July 3rd and 4th. These two days were full of activities and events that were held in our community which were long over due.

My main goal and objective for the Heart Beat of the Bakken Days was to bring our people together in our community as well as other communities throughout our reservation. I wanted to have a lot of activities and events for everyone to enjoy. This took a lot of planning and the staff I have here did an excellent job in doing their part to see that every event and activity took place. I assigned each staff member activities and events so the staff here were pretty busy on those two days. I wanted to make sure we had activities for everyone to enjoy. For elders and others we had people who were massage therapist and Doctors from Denver, Colorado who did acupuncture for those that needed it and that was free to our community members. I worked with Marilyn Young Bird to schedule the massages and therapists.

Our fireworks display from Iowa, which turned out really nice you could see that people really enjoyed the fireworks display. Even for myself I have not seen a firework display like that here our own community. We had fun on the run for the kids right on the celebration grounds and everything was free of charge.

Again I would like to acknowledge the staff who work for me they all did an outstanding job, I am very proud of each of them we have a lot of teamwork here when we put on events or activities for our people here in our community.

I would like to thank the Roads Department for their help during the Bakken Days cutting grass for us. Also a big thank you to Kelly Spotted Bear, who broke up the ground for the rodeo. He did this on his own time and it was on a Sunday so he went above and beyond to help us, so I wanted him to know that we appreciated his help. I would also like to congratulate the Mandaree Elders staff for the work they did for the elders trip to Deadwood. I know every elder that went appreciated their little get away time.

It was with the hard work of the staff and our community members who all helped make the Bakken Days a success. Little do we know we are setting an example for the rest of the communities on our reservation.

Right now I have staff members helping the 2013 Mandaree Celebration committee prepare for our upcoming celebration. West Segment staff members are busy and addressing our dumpster situation and taking care of our trash. We are in dire need of more dumpsters and equipment for our community.

On another note I would like the people in our community to know that I am still pursuing the 60 age limit to 55. I have a resolution in place and it should be ready for the August council meeting. I would also like everyone to know that I addressed our roads issues in June to fix up our roads on routes 12 and 14 and Chairman Hall assured me that 14 is being worked on by Foote Construction for dust control and reshaping of the road. Route 12 repairs will begin in August. I requested to our Chairman to make a public announcement on our Mandaree roads repairs on routes 14 and 12.

Another item on my to do list is to look into health cards for all our enrolled members. Office additions to the Water Chief Hall will be done by next week. We will have pictures in next months newspaper so you will know how our expansion looks.

In closing I would like all our kids to know that we will have Jack "Goose" Givens here for a free basketball clinic that is free for 3rd grade and up on July 15 to July 17th a great opportunity for our kids.

Jack "Goose" Givens is a retired American collegiate and professional basketball player Jack "Goose" Givens will be hosting the basketball clinic at the Mandaree High School gym. With that in mind, I would like to encourage all parents in our community to take advantage of this and send your students and children to this clinic.

This basketball clinic is sponsored by the West Segment Development Corporation.

This was the very first time for the Mandaree Community to have The 2013 Heart Beat of The Bakken Days Celebration. The Pow wow had 107 registered dancers and sixteen drum groups throughout Indian country

for a one evening event which turned out to be a great success! This celebration was catered for everyone to enjoy, along side of the pow wow there was a huge fireworks display. To keep the pow wow fun the committee asked singers from drum groups to participate in a high heels contest, where each singer had to wear a pair of high heels and run around the dance bowery twice and tag off with their partner. Laughter and applause roared from the audience who watched these singers in high heel shoes it was hilarious to watch men run in high heels. Only three drum groups participated. The winners for this contest were listed by the drum groups: 1st place: Grand River, 2nd place: North Bear, 3rd Place Young Bucks.

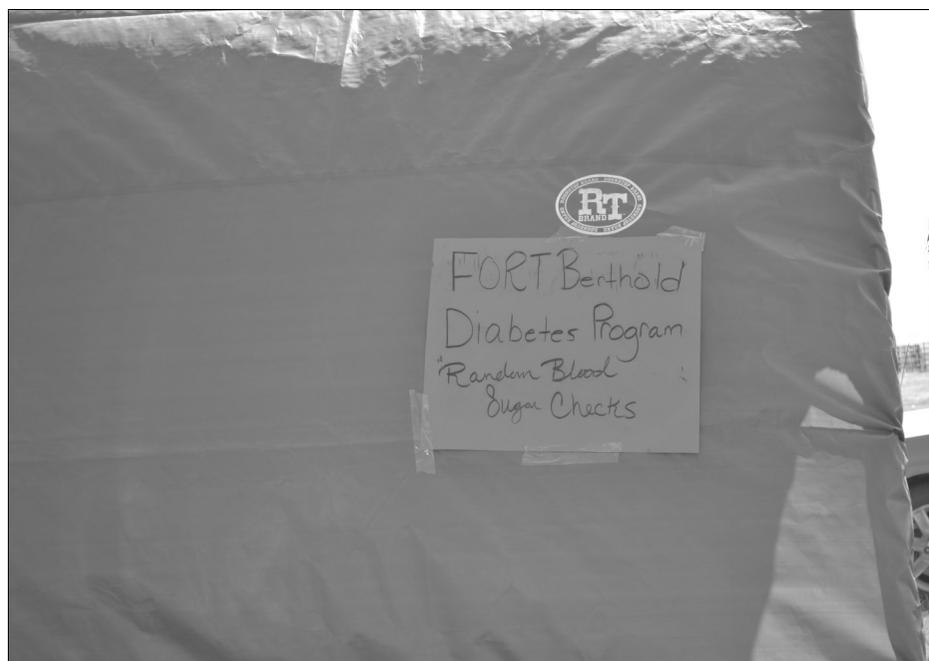

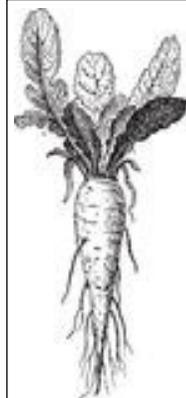

# Pow Wow Season is in Full Swing



What a great way to celebrate family and strengthen the cultural ties that bonds us together as a nation and a people. To encourage family to heal in the sacred circle by coming together in the "Spirit of Love" supporting each other and honoring one another with a humble and sacrificial heart.

Love is one of the strongest energy forces on this earth and the Creator has blessed us with this power and gift of Himself, because He is Love. When we come together to support one another be it blood relative or clan relative it is in the expression of support and love.

The Creator has blessed us with a time to come together and build up strength to weather the hard times in life. He has also created ways to for the people to mend and heal the broken heart and spirit. When the principals of the ceremony are applied with respect and honor the healing process can begin

When we gather together in the sacred circle to celebrate in thanksgiving in song and dance we need to be reminded what we are thankful for. The ability to dance as others may be dealing with afflictions and can't stand on their own. To pray in song for those who are less fortunate and pitiful. All of these qualities and much more make for a time of celebration.

To dishonor the sacred circle is to bring with you, jealousy, pride, strife, or being under the influence of drugs or alcohol. We all have a spirit and this is what our ancestors understood and operated from this level. They had to maintain a spiritual balance in order to communicate with the Creator. It was important for the people that we had a "High Priest" who interceded on our behalf in prayer and worship. This is very much the same way it was in the Old Testament. It was always the "High Priest" who was the only one allowed in the Holy of Holies, the most sacred place in the Temple of God. To dishonor the sacred circle would bring ultimate death for the "High Priest" he had to come in with a pure heart and mind, singing and dancing as He worshipped and thanking the Creator as he brought the prayers for the people.

When Jesus died on the cross, the veil of the temple of God was ripped, which was the place of Holy of Holies. Matthew 27:51 "Then behold, the veil of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom; and the earth quaked, and the rocks were split." Jesus had destroyed the veil in the temple, the High Priest could not bring the sacrifices of the

temple. Jesus had made a way for ALL people now to come into the presence of the Creator by worship and prayer as Jesus was teaching His disciples, to not worry or fear, He would be with them always, in Spirit. When we pray we are entering into the temple and accessing the "Kingdom of Heaven" as He had been teaching His disciples throughout the New Testament of the "Kingdom of God". Now we can all enter the Holy of Holies which is within us.

Luke 17:21-22 Now when He was asked by the Pharisees when the Kingdom of God would come, He answered them and said, "The Kingdom of God does not come with observation;" 22 "Nor will they say, 'See here! or 'See there! for indeed, the Kingdom of God is within you."

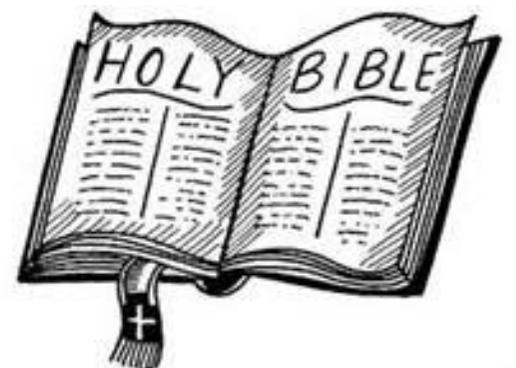

# The Power Of Jesus



Have you ever wondered about Gospel passages that include the manifestation of demons? The following is a passage from the Gospel of Mark that relates one encounter of Jesus with an unclean spirit.

*“Then they came to Capernaum, and on the Sabbath Jesus entered the synagogue and taught. The people were astonished at his teaching, for he taught them on having authority and not as the scribes. In their synagogue was a man with an unclean spirit; he cried out, “What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are—the Holy One of God!” Jesus rebuked him and said, “Quiet, Come out of Him!”*

*The unclean spirit convulsed him and with a loud cry came out of him. All were amazed and asked one another, “What is this? A new teaching with authority. He commands even the unclean spirits and they obey him.” His fame spread everywhere throughout the whole region of Galilee.” (Mark 1:21~28)*

Notice that in this passage the unclean spirit intuits Jesus’ divine nature, it comprehends that he is the “Holy One of God.” The unclean spirit becomes agitated in the presence of Jesus and screams out, “What have you to do with us? Have you come to destroy us?” The evil spirit is agitated because it knows that Jesus will not continue to allow it to possess the man in the synagogue. Jesus simply says with authority to the spirit, “Quiet, come out of him,” and with a loud cry the spirit comes out of him.

In faith, and due to our baptism into Christ, we can speak in the name and power of Jesus and drive out demons, manifested or not, that try to take over our lives. The unclean spirits may take the form of addiction, jealousy, hatred, greed, lust, dishonesty, and the list continues. As long as we allow the “unclean spirit” free reign in

our life and don’t disturb it by trying to change our old habits, it will not become agitated, because it wants us to remain in a state of misery and feel hopeless. But when Jesus enters in, just as he “entered into the synagogue” in the passage above, the unclean spirit will get upset and do it’s best to try to keep us away from hearing and accepting Jesus’ gentle invitation to live in freedom. The demon knows it has no ultimate power over Jesus.

When we encounter unclean spirits what should we do? Pray, pray, and pray some more. Speak the name of Jesus, and ask him to surround you and send his angels and saints to protect you, your family and your home. Keep Holy Water or some blessed article, such as a Crucifix, or Holy Card close to you, such as in your pocket, and keep these items in your home as well. Call upon your Guardian Spirit to protect you with the following prayer: “Angel of God, my guardian dear, to whom God’s love commits me here. Ever this day be at my side to light and guard, to rule and guide. Amen”.

## Work continues on ND 22 North of the Lost Bridge to ND 73

Construction work continues on ND Highway 22 from the Lost Bridge north of Killdeer to ND Highway 73 and motorists should be advised of heavy truck traffic in the area as dirt and gravel are hauled to designated areas throughout the construction zone.

The project consists of widening and curve realignment of ND 22 from the Lost Bridge to ND 73. The project will add climbing lanes, turning lanes and Highway Patrol truck inspection areas to this portion of ND 22 and is tentatively scheduled for completion in late fall.

During construction:

- Speeds will be reduced to 45 mph and 25 mph while on temporary roadways
- Workers will be present during night time hours
- Flaggers will be present
- Gravel surface will be present on temporary roadways

Help prevent work zone crashes. Motorists are encouraged to slow down, allow extra distance between their vehicles and the vehicle in front of them, use caution and obey flaggers and posted signs.

The Three Affiliated Head Start staff will be on furlough leave from June 24 to August 5, 2013. There will be on employees at the Central Office located in New Town during this time so we are making accommodation's to serve individuals who are interested in enrolling their child or children.

Applications for children enrollment in the upcoming 2013-2014 school year can be picked up at each local segment office, picked up at the post office in each community, picked up from various places of business in each community, also applications can be downloaded from the MHA Nation website. Applications can be mailed in before August 5, 2013, otherwise parents/guardians can drop off completed applications at the Central Office starting August 5, 2013. The application is for both returning and new children.

A list of required documents to complete the enrollment packet is on the front page of the application. This year our Head Start program is requiring that all physicals and immunizations be completed before the child's application is considered complete. An incomplete application will hold up a child's placement in our program.

Head Start school year will begin September 16, 2013. Head start staff will also be in the outlying communities for recruitment the week of August 12, 2013. Parents will be notified by mail for enrollment information the week of August 23, 2013.

If you have a head start age child or know of a family of a head start child please fill out an application for enrollment!

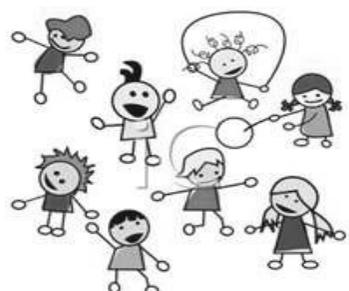

# What You Need To Know About The West Nile Virus

## What is West Nile Virus?

West Nile virus is a virus that may cause different types of disease, such as fevers or encephalitis (swelling of the brain) It is spread by mosquitoes that have the virus and then give it to humans by biting them.

## Who is at risk for West Nile virus?

Anyone of all ages is at risk, but older adults are more likely to develop severe symptoms.

## What are the symptoms of West Nile virus?

Most people who become infected will show no symptoms. If symptoms do appear, they usually are mild and include fever, headache, body aches, nausea, vomiting and rash. More severe symptoms include confusion, convulsions, coma, paralysis or even death.

## How soon do symptoms appear?

Symptoms usually appear five to 15 days after the bite of an infected mosquito.

## How is West Nile virus spread?

It is spread through the bite of an infected mosquito. On rare occasions, people can be infected through blood transfusions or receipt of an infected organ. Since the discovery of West Nile in the United States, new tests have been developed to reduce the risk of blood or organ exposure; as a result these infections are now very rare.

## When and for how long is a person able to spread the disease?

People are not able to spread the disease to others. West Nile virus is spread by the bite of infected mosquitoes.

## How is a person diagnosed?

A blood test can determine if you have been exposed to the virus.

## What is the treatment?

There is no specific treatment for West Nile virus, and antibiotics will not work. However, health-care providers may offer supportive therapy (ie, rest, fluids) to help manage symptoms.

## Does past infection make a person immune?

Yes. People build up immunity to West Nile virus. However, this virus is still new to the United States, so how long the immunity lasts is uncertain at this time.



## Should children or others be excluded from day care, school, work or other activities if they have West Nile virus?

No. Infants, toddlers and school-aged children should not be excluded unless the staff determines the child is unwilling or unable to participate in activities. They also should be excluded if the staff determines that they cannot care for the child without compromising their ability to care for the health and safety of the other children in the group. All others can attend work and other functions as long as they are well enough to do so.

## What can be done to prevent the spread of West Nile Virus?

A person can prevent the spread of West Nile virus by trying to avoid mosquito bites. A person can do this by using insect repellent containing DEET; staying inside from dusk to dawn (if possible); checking windows to make sure there are no holes in the screens that allow mosquitoes to get indoors; and by emptying standing water from buckets, pet dishes, wading pools, flowerpots and other sources that can attract mosquitoes.

# Insect Repellent Use & Safety For Your Information

## Why Should I use insect repellent?

Repellents help prevent mosquito bites that may carry viruses such as West Nile virus that can cause serious illness. Using insect repellent allows you to continue to play and work outdoors with a reduced risk of mosquito bites.

## Are all insect repellents the same?

No. There are many types of repellent with different concentrations of active ingredients. The CDC recommends the use of products registered with the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Repellent containing the active ingredients DEET, picaridin, IR3535 or oil of lemon eucalyptus offer protection from mosquito bites and can be used on skin and clothing. Permethrin is another type of repellent which is only for use on clothing and gear, not the skin. A general rule when using insect repellents is to always follow the manufacturers directions.

## What is the proper way to use repellents?

Always follow the directions on the product label. Choose a repellent that will provide sufficient protection for the time being spent outdoors and use over exposed skin and clothing. Do not apply repellent to skin under clothing or if the skin is broken or irritated. Do not spray repellent directly to the face, instead, spray on hands first then apply to the face.

## When should I wear mosquito repellents?

Repellent should be applied whenever you are going to be outdoors, even if you do not see any mosquitoes. Many of the mosquitoes that carry the West Nile virus are likely to bite between dusk and dawn. If you are outdoors during that time, it is especially important to apply repellent.

## How often should repellent be re-applied?

Follow the directions on the product you are using in order to determine how frequently you need to re-apply repellent. You may need to re-apply more frequently if sweating or after getting wet. Repellents containing a higher concentration of active ingredient typically provide longer-lasting protection.

## Can I use an insect repellent containing DEET and apply sunscreen at the same time?

Yes. People can and should use both sunscreen and insect repellent when they are outdoors to protect their health. Follow the directions on the product label. In general, apply sunscreen first, followed by repellent. Though, the use of combination sunscreen/insect repellent products containing DEET is not recommended due to different instructions on how frequently the products should be applied. Typically, insect repellent containing DEET does not need to be applied as frequently as sunscreen. At this time, there are no recommendations on using sunscreen in combination with other repellent active ingredients.

## Are insect repellents safe to use on children?

The product label will state if there are any restrictions for the use of the repellent. The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) offers advice for the use of DEET containing repellent in children. Because DEET is so widely used, a great deal of testing has been done. Repellent with DEET can be used for both adults and children, according to directions. However, children under the age of 2 months should not use DEET at any concentration. Oil of lemon eucalyptus products specify on the label that they should NOT be used on children under 3 years of age. Never allow children to apply repellent to themselves and be careful not to apply repellent on the child's hands to prevent the indirect ingestion of repellent.

## Can I use insect repellent if pregnant or nursing?

Yes. There are no any additional precautions for the use of EPA registered repellents in pregnant or nursing women. Ask your doctor if you have additional questions.

## Are there any risks due to using insect repellents?

Use of these products may cause skin reactions in rare cases. Always follow the instructions on the product label. If you suspect a reaction to a product, discontinue use, wash the treated skin and call your physician or local poison control center. The number to reach Poison Control is 800.222.1222.

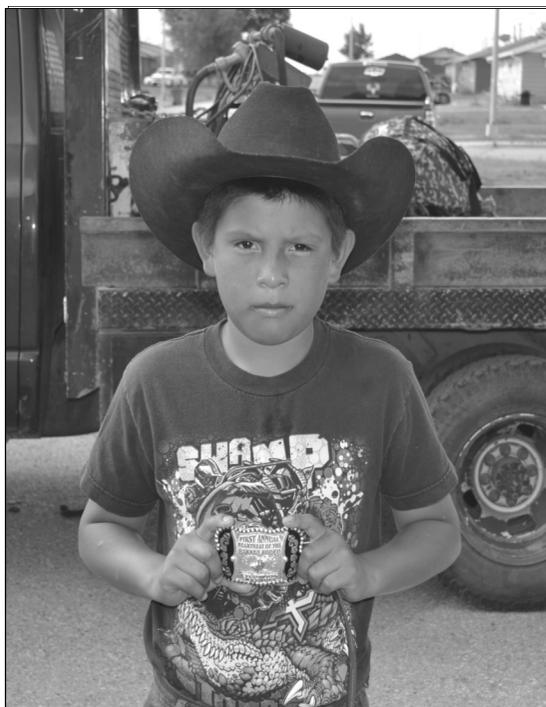
