



Hello Community Members and relatives, would like to wish each of you a good day. Before I begin this month's update, I would like to take time to

With the Fall season upon us now, it's time for most of us to get ready for the upcoming cold winter months. Just a reminder to our elders of our community, don't forget to call the Mandaree Elders Program to get on the list so plastic can be put on your windows before our cold weather really sets in.

On another note, I would like to remind all community members who request for financial help from the West Segment office. Every tribal member who requests help is allotted \$250.00 each. Some members request \$500.00 which is the full sum total of what I help each community member with. So if you come in and request five hundred dollars than you have already exceeded your help for the year. If you came in and requested \$250.00 than you would be able to come back in if you needed help again than we would help you with another \$250.00 as long as you don't exceed the amount of \$500.00. This needs to be cleared up because it causes confusion amongst our tribal members. In any case, if it's

an emergency an you already have used up your funds, we will consider your emergency and do what we can to help you. I don't turn anyone away and I do my best to help everyone who needs help.

Many positive things are now happening in our West Segment community, as you can all see the Hidatsa Housing project is taking off with the foundations nearly completed. The first thirty homes for the Hidatsa Project should be in place by mid December which isn't far away, we thank you for your patience.

The West Segment Development Corporation recently had a ribbon cutting ceremony at the old MEC building. This is another positive move for our community, the ribbon cutting ceremony was for a food pantry and shelter for the domestic violence program. This program has approached other communities throughout the reservation in hopes of placing shelters in each of the segments. Fortunately, the West Segment community is the first segment to give them a place for their shelter and a food pantry.

We are also on the move with the new trailer park the ground has been broken up and leveled out so now we just need to get the water lines in place. The trailer park will be a great asset to our West Segment community.

With Thanksgiving right around the corner, I would like to invite everyone to our Community Thanksgiving Dinner on Tuesday, November 26th at 6 pm here at the Water Chief Hall. So bring your families and enjoy a great Thanksgiving Dinner.

The Hidatsa Elder Board is currently taking applications/requests for Medical and Emergency Assistance.

The Guidelines that will be Followed for Assistance Are:

1. Member of the MHA Nation
2. At least 60 years of age at the time of application/request.
3. Lives and/or are eligible voters for Mandaree (West Segment).

Assistance given will be as Follows:

1. Glasses: \$250 for fiscal year.
2. Dentures: \$1,500 for fiscal year.
3. Hearing Aides: \$1,500 for fiscal year.
4. Medical emergencies and appointments (travel and meals): Up to \$500 for fiscal year.

*Dental appointments will no longer be paid for, only Dentures. IHS provides dental services and what they cannot take care of they refer out and pay the bill, we cannot continue to cover expenses that are free through HIS services.

- Medical emergencies will be taken into consideration when \$500 limit has been reached.
- All applications must be turned in 3 business days before funds are needed, for processing purposes.
- Applications can be picked up at the Mandaree Elder's Program office.
- Office hours are from 8-4:30 Monday-Friday. Bernadine Fredericks and Ted White will be able to assist you.

Councilman Phelan then approached the West Segment Development Corporation Board (WSDC) to fund the trailer park. Which was exactly what WSDC did. They hired Myron Johnson to do the construction of the land as you can see in these photos. Another first for the West Segment Community.

The goal is to have this completed before the winter months set in and trailer homes can begin moving in. The location is on the side of the road east of the Mandaree Celebration grounds, which does not disturb any campsites for the summer months.




weigh about 1,700 lbs.

According to MHA Tribal Ranch Director, Ted Siers stated that these buffalo came from Medora Round up but was called the soft round up from Medora. He also stated that our MHA Tribal Ranch now has three hundred and twenty five head of buffalo which includes what they got from the Medora Soft round up.

On the day they brought in the buffalo in these photos, they brought in forty eight head with eleven bulls and fifteen calves. According to the MHA Tribal Ranch Director they are hoping to increase the number of the head of buffalo the ranch now has.



Grand Opening For Domestic Violence



Another first for the West Segment community, with Members of the West Segment Development Board along with our West Segment Council Representative; Randy Phelan and the Domestic Violence Staff were on hand for the ribbon cutting ceremony that took place earlier this month at the old MEC building. The West Segment Development Board recently renovated the old MEC building. The Fort Berthold Coalition Against Domestic Violence has been working to create safe houses in every community on our reservation. The WSDC gave the Coalition space in the old MEC building for use as a shelter and food pantry. The MEC building was once the Mandaree Community center then used by the Mandaree Enterprise Corporation for subcontracted work.

According to our Councilman Phelan he gave his view points on this. "We are trying to get services that our community members need, this building took a lot of renovating but we are moving in the right direction. I have always been an advocate for our domestic violence programs. Our families have always dealt with a lot of problems with alcohol and drugs. They need the help not only here in Mandaree but across the whole reservation. If we start here maybe it will escalate to bigger and better things for the whole reservation. I think this is the first time anyone has stepped forward on Fort Berthold to help the program."

According to Sadie, she stated; "The first thing people will see when they enter the building will be a food pantry. The coalition decided to include a food pantry in their plans as a way of showing their appreciation for the Mandaree community's generosity. We are hoping the food pantry will be open next month. Photos to your right are of the rooms available for Domestic Violence cliental. According to Young Bird she says women will be able to stay at the shelter for

As you can see these rooms look brand new with the new flooring and paint. Both are rooms for the Domestic Violence cliental.



30 days. After that, the program will try to help the women find a longer term place to live. With the food pantry right there will be a staff person. The shelter will be staffed 24/7 with four full time and one part time staff.

Young Bird thanked the Mandaree community for their support. The WSDC has been very helpful. They really want to help our program and their community. Councilman Phelan has always been a very big advocate for our program."

With the many projects going on here in the Mandaree community, you can bet you will see more on the way. The WSDC is also looking at the possibility of implementing other businesses such as a laundromat, it will definitely be some other useful business that our community members can benefit from. West Segment community has a lot of ambitious people and a leader who is willing to make a positive difference that will certainly benefit everyone.



School Closing and Delays:

Every effort is made to have school everyday identified in the school board approved calendar. Sometimes events beyond our control similar to the transformer going down or winter weather conditions necessitate a delay to the start of the school day or school cancellation. In the event of a late start or school closure notifications are made to KFVR-TV and KXNET for posting on the 'close line' that scrolls across the top of the television. A call is made to KMHA 91.3 FM and they get it on the air when they can. It is also posted on the school's face book page- 'like us' at Mandaree Warriors. You will know you have reached the official page when you see the school logo on the main page. Students who cannot make it to school because we cannot get buses out to the country residences receive an excused absence for the day.

IMMUNIZATIONS:

Immunizations protect your child and others from preventable diseases. Students are required to have the following immunizations prior to school entrance. DTaP=5 doses; Polio=4 doses; MMR=3 doses, Hepatitis B=3 doses; Varicella=2 doses, Tdap=1 dose; Meningococcal-1 dose

These requirements can be waived only for medical, philosophical, moral, or religious reasons. Please be aware that if you choose to waive the requirement you are putting your child and those they come into contact with at risk. If an outbreak occurs you may have to keep your child at home for several days and up to several weeks. You are also responsible for notifying the school if your unvaccinated child comes into contact with a vaccine-preventable disease.

WELLNESS POLICY AND SNACKS BROUGHT FROM HOME:

The Wellness Policy for Mandaree School is in accordance with state guidelines. With the first classroom parties right around the corner in October parents need to be aware of the following school guidelines.

1. Each child is to bring their own individual healthy snack.
2. Please do not send classroom size snacks (ie one for each student in classroom).
3. Excess snacks will be discarded before students leave for the day.
4. No excess snacks will be allowed on the buses.

The ICU Program:

ICU stands for Intensive Care Unit, just like the hospital. Students learn quickly that is they have one missing assignment; their grade is sick and needs attention. The goal is to implement the process and avoid students reaching the end of a semester and totally disengage because they know they are not going to get the credit/grade. ICU is a communication tool, a shared, school-wide document that tracks missing students assignments. The document helps teachers and administrators communicate with each other as well as with the students and their parents. The student and the assignment are entered into ICU list which is used to provide the student with extra time and extra help they need to complete the assignment. In most instances a student get the assignment completed with just a few ICU sessions. In some instances a "Family Day" is needed for intense intervention to get a student back on track. Family Day is an opportunity for the student and a caring family member (mom, dad, aunt, uncle, etc.) to work together with teachers to complete as many assignments as possible. Teachers will be scheduled to provide instruction if needed. It is important that parents keep current contact information on file at the school so that quick and timely notification of missing assignments reaches them. Students who have missing assignments at the end of the quarter will receive an "Incomplete" in the courses/subject. Teachers are unable to enter a complete grade until all assignments are handed in and graded.

TIME TO DRESS FOR THE WEATHER:

The weather will start to change rather quickly. Be sure your child is prepared for outside recess with hat, cap, gloves and coat. Students do go outside when the temperature is above 0 degrees.

REMINDERS:

1. First Bell is 8:17 am
2. Last Bell is 3:34pm
3. Every Wednesday students are dismissed at 2pm
4. Parents must call in with bus transportation changes before 2pm to ensure that their child get on the right bus. Notifications after that time does not give the office, the teacher, the bus driver or the child ample notice of the change and creates confusion at dismissal time.

5. K-6 Students arriving at school after 9:00 am are counted 1/2 absent.
6. Students must be in school until 2:15pm to be as present for a full day.
7. Students who accumulate 10 or more unexcused absences may be considered for grade level retention in grades k-6.
8. Students who accumulate 10 or more unexcused absences in grades 7-12 will be non-credited in that class period.

The Light Of Faith



On June 29, 2013, the Solemnity of the Saints Peter and Paul, Pope Francis released his first papal encyclical letter, which was begun by his predecessor, Benedict XVI. A papal encyclical is a

teaching written on some aspect of the faith for the spiritual edification and guidance of all members of the church. Some years ago, Pope Benedict XVI set out to write a series of three encyclicals on Faith, Hope, and Love, the three theological virtues that St. Paul writes about in his letter to the Corinthians. The first two encyclicals were on Love and Hope and were completed by Pope Benedict himself. He began the third one on Faith, but did not have it completed before he resigned in April of 2013. Pope Francis took it up and brought it to completion. I would like to highlight a few points that the Pope made in his writings.

What is Faith? In his encyclical Pope Francis writes, "In Faith, Christ is not simply the one in whom we believe, the supreme manifestation of God's love; he is also the one with whom we are united precisely in order to believe. Faith does not merely gaze at Jesus, but see things as Jesus himself sees them, with his own eyes: it is a participation in his way of seeing. In many areas of our lives we trust others who know more than we do. We trust the architect who builds our home, the pharmacist who gives us medicine for healing, the lawyer who defends us in court. We also need someone trustworthy and knowledgeable where God is concerned. Jesus, the Son of God, is the one who makes God known to us {cf. John 1:18}. "We can trust

Jesus. We can put our faith in Jesus and welcome him into our lives and follow his footsteps along the way of life. Faith comes through hearing and through seeing, through the word and through light, says Pope Francis. And once the word is heard and accepted, it calls for a response on our part. Our positive response, in love, brings light, God's light, to those around us. We can tell when a person carries the light of God within. They are at peace with themselves and find joy, even amidst the suffering and pain of the world. Joy is found because trust has been placed in Jesus, who has conquered sin and death, and promised eternal life to those who say yes, in faith, to his invitation for "come, follow me."

Pope Francis ends the letter with a beautiful prayer asking for the intercession of Mary, Mother of the Church and the Mother of our faith, "Mother, help our faith! Open our ears to hear God's word and recognize his voice and call. Awaken in us a desire to follow in his footsteps, to go forth from our own land and to receive his promise. Help us to be touched by his love, that we may touch him in faith. Help us to entrust ourselves fully to him and to believe in his love, especially at times of trial, beneath the shadow of the cross, when our faith is called to mature. Sow in our faith the joy of the Risen One. Remind us that those who believe are never alone. Teach us to see all things with the eyes of Jesus, that he may be light for our path. And may this light of faith always increase in us, until the dawn of that undying day which is Christ himself, your Son, our Lord!

Hay Bales Need to be Removed from North Dakota Rights of way by November 1

All hay bales on North Dakota highway rights of way, must be removed by Friday, November 1. Hay bales remaining on rights of way after November 1, will be removed as directed by the District Engineer. The bales need to be removed for snow management and safety reasons. North Dakota Century Code prohibits hay from being placed in the right of way except on the outer edge. Large round bales must not be placed on in-slopes or within 60 feet from the outside edge of the driving lane.
