So one can't be too careful in a very small community, so we do need to take precautions instead of acting on something after it happens, we want to be prepared. Security has increased at the Water Chief Hall there will always be someone inside the walls of the Hall. All employees at the West Segment Tribal office are also required to sign in and out. So when you do step inside the hall just know that you will be asked to sign in and out. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.

## West Segment Tribal Representative Update



Hello Community members and relatives. Here it is March I hope we will see some nice warm weather.

Before I begin this update I would like to extend my condolences and sympathies to the families of Bonita (Bunny) Fimbres and the Matthew Hunts Along Jr., family and relatives, during your time of loss.

The first thing I would like to give you an update on is our trailer site that we are calling the Mandaree Marriott which is located where the old day care used to be. Right now they're putting in the sewage and water lines and finishing up the decks. We are going to put another trailer there so we will have 12 rooms available for people to stay the night in. We are trying to get these done as soon as we possibly can because we can create revenue for our community. You can see pictures on page 6.

Also for the elders, I recently met with the board and I must say they are doing an outstanding job by taking care of business by themselves. This is something that I wanted to happen in our community is that we have our own board and they meet the needs of our elders. So the board takes care of everything for the elders. In meeting with them and in one of the things I am going to ask the West Segment Development Board is to give every elder in our community an elder card. A card with their name on it and date of birth or however they want it designed. With this elder card if the board approves this then the elder can take their elder card and get 10 cents off on a gallon of gas at the Mandaree One Stop. This would help our elders out and our community and promote more gas from our store. Just to help our elders out and to help our community store so it's a win win for both.

I am also having them look into elder's Health insurance so we can have our own health insurance costs and see what it will cost us. So our goal is to furnish each of our elders with their own health insurance card and they will be able to go anywhere and with the kind of health insurance we want there would be no cost for their medicines. This insurance would be like Blue Cross blue shield, with dental and vision so we will look for the best costs and the best for our elders. We want to keep the cost down for our elders, and this is for ages 60 on up. I also told the council I am still pushing for 55 so the council is aware of that I still have to do my homework so I can get it passed by the council. So I am going to keep on bugging them until I can get it. This insurance that I want for our elders is just for the West Segment elders. My only concern is just taking care of our people in our community. This is really needed for our elders here.

I also ask the Hidatsa elders to put a logo together so they can have their own, logo so we can purchase jackets for them. So we are trying to make things easier and better for our elders in our

community. I mentioned to the board that when my term is up in four years I would like to see our community be self sufficient so we don't always have to rely on the tribe for everything. So if our elders need something we can get it for them right here. And I know we are going to be there we just got to create things and make things happen.

On another note of an update is the Black Eagle Estates, I would say between half and three quarters done. We are projecting by the end of April to have all the houses in with the electricity hooked up, and hopefully the rain season won't hold us back. Seems like we've had weather problems but as everyone can see the homes are coming up now and it's looking better and better. They brought in equipment now so they will be working on the roads and start landscaping so we can install our sprinkler systems in. The sod and they will bring in new grass for the yards so it will start taking shape here real soon, with nice yards and nice grass and a fence will put up so stray dogs won't be coming in it will be fenced off. You can see pictures of the homes on page 6 of our newspaper here. Also for our elders they will once again have a trip to Deadwood so call and make your reservations. We will have a new bus for the elders to travel in. It should be here any day now, the bus has chair lifts for wheelchairs its really nice.

As far as our clinic now I talked to Dawn Berg and she told me that they will be moving their inventory up to the Wellness Center and get situated so they can start seeing patients there. The new clinic is located inside the Mandaree Wellness Center. So they will need a week to move all the medical records and all the equipment up the Mandaree Wellness Center.

I would like to thank Larry Fox and his construction company for doing an outstanding job. We are also putting office inside the old community building. We will have offices for law enforcement, fish and game, environmental or if not it will be TERO if they want to leave their location here at Water Chief Hall. So a lot of our tribal offices will be located in the old community building. We will start renovation and construction on Monday. Hidatsa Housing will be moving over there too. We already have a waiting list for the use of our offices here at the Water Chief Hall. People and companies that need to lease office space so that need is there.

Another item that I want to talk about is our trash, our trash has been a sore eye right behind our community center. So what I did there was I directed our maintenance to pick up all the trash in fact they're out there today and you can see pictures on page 6 of the newspaper here. I am having them move all the dumpsters below the old community center. So that will be our new transfer station so we won't have trash behind our community being a sore eye to everyone. So the new transfer station has been fenced off and we need the cooperation of all our community members when you go and take your trash out please let us be respectful and put your trash in the dumpster don't just set it on the ground and leave because the dogs get into it than there's trash just blows all over than it becomes an eye sore for our community. I am having a construction company build a high fence around this so the trash won't blow around.

Remember our Mandaree One Stop Store is now open 24 hrs. a day seven days a week. I will mention my plan on propane needs in our next article.

Elders remember we will have Chair exercise's at the Mandaree Senior meal site every Monday at 10:30. Jonelle Howling Wolf will be doing the chair exercises' and she will also be sponsoring an incentive for sessions attended. She will do fitness assessments throughout the program which ends in October.

The staff at the Mandaree Elders Program are gearing up for more trips for the elders during the summer months. The elders will be getting a new bus which will be here soon. So keep in mind Elders if we get 5 or more elders to go to the Casino in New Town we will start going again on Tuesdays. The bus has 10 seats and 2 wheelchair seating available with a 26 inch flat screen for long trips.

The Hidatsa elders would like to thank Randy for providing the new bus that will fit their needs.

The first trip if we have 5 people or more on March 30 to attend the White Shield March into Madness event which they invited our mandated elders. If they are interested they are also welcome too by themselves. Sign in by calling our office to reserve seating. Our next trip will to Minot on April 11th for the annual flea market with over 250 vendors taking home crafts. Call and reserve seating and get more trip activities information .

# Mandaree Hidatsa Housing Program

## From the Hidatsa Housing Director's Desk



The Hidatsa Housing Program currently located in the Water Chief Hall is in full swing!

The office is currently staffed by myself, Will Reeves as the Director. I am the grandson of the late Phillip and Delia (Montclair) Baker of Independence, son of Sonny and Ethel Baker Reeves and my co worker RD Bailey as the Rental Specialist, from the Northern Cheyenne

Tribe.

The office is responsible for the overall program management of the segment's new housing development's to include Black Eagle Estates and the future Nathan Good Iron Memorial Veterans Complex, White Oak Mobile Park, scatter type homes.

The program staff is currently working on the Black Eagle Estates home project. As of this writing we have had about 70 families apply for the 30 homes that will be completed. The weather has been a major factor in the transportation and placement of the homes. But now mother nature is cooperating with us lately and we expect more homes to come in each week moving forward.

There is still a lot of excavating to be completed including the installation of the sidewalks, decking and we are also looking at installing sprinkler systems.

The staff will be making contact in the coming weeks to applicants who need to complete their required documentation.


As of this publication our office will not be accepting anymore applications for the Black Eagle Estates project.

Councilman Phelan and the staff are searching for new housing companies that can provide scatter site housing, but we have a lot of research to do with regards to getting our members the best bang for our buck and some legal hurdles with regards to the homestead site from private land owners.

The housing office is open Monday-Friday 8:30 A.M.-5:00 P.M. excluding tribally recognized holidays. The main office number is 701-204-0049 and the Fax number is 701-205-3671. I will do the best I can to serve each and every one of you.

### West Segment Has Their Own Information Technologist Working at The Water Chief





### Are You Ready For The Next Steps?

On the Fort Berthold Reservation there is a tremendous need for people in health careers. For example, the local Elbowoods clinic is chronically short-handed and needs doctors, nurses, social workers and so on. Some of those career needs can be filled by people on the Fort Berthold reservation through a program called Next Steps.

The Next Steps Program creates a career ladder allowing entry and promoting advancement within the healthcare workforce such as Elbowoods clinic which is growing and will soon include a hospital, emergency care, staff housing and more.

Next Steps will provide educational support services for the following programs: CAN (Certified Nursing Assistant); LPN (Licensed Practical Nurse); RN (Registered Nurse); LRD (Licensed Registered Dietitian); LSW (Licensed Social Worker); HIT (Health Information Technician); EMT (Emergency Medical Technician); Paramedic (Licensed Paramedic); Phlebotomy (Licensed Phlebotomist) Pharmacy (Technician); CMA (Certified Medical Aides); and Dietetic (Technicians).

Next Steps support short term training programs throughout the state of ND and in Minnesota. Please check your local educational institution for their short term training programs. In Minnesota, at Moorhead they offer Health Information Technology, medical transcription, pharmacy technician, and medical coding, and at Northland Technical College they offer Paramedic, Pharmacy technology and Phlebotomy training.


The criterion for eligibility for this program is: documentation of tribal enrollment; verification of low income with preference given to TANF participants; and verification of acceptance into the training program. The Next Steps also requires a background check of all participants.

The Next Steps program provides monitoring, tuition and fee assistance, books and equipment support, childcare assistance, transportation assistance and counseling and academic advisement. However, because funding ends in Spring of 2015, the staff is currently focusing on short term healthcare training.

The Next Steps program is a federal grant program funded through the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to the Candeska Cikana Community College in Fort Totten, North Dakota.

The Next Steps Program has been in existence since 2011 and has worked with the FBCC Nursing Program. Next Steps has assisted 11 students who have graduated from the FBCC Nursing Programs; seven of these students are now pursuing their Bachelors of Science in Nursing and will graduate by 2015.

### ICU

#### End of the Year Process

**Reviewed with students on March 4, 2014**

**Every student completes every assignment**

Parents we really need your support in getting assignments turned in and students off the ICU List. This information was shared with students and it is posted in the school. Teachers are available to provide extra time and extra help everyday before the first bell. Kindergarten through grade 6 teachers have time built in their schedule for support. Students in grades 7-12 have ICU time daily at mid-day at lunch time. There is ample opportunity for students to get the extra time and extra support to get in the assignments that are owed.

Students need to be aware that the following procedures for incomplete assignments will be followed:

1. There will be a 2 week ICU Completion Camp May 27-June 6, 2014 for students to complete assignments on the ICU List.
2. Any assignment not completed by June 6, 2014 will be carried over to the 2014-2015 school year.
3. Students will receive an "Incomplete" in all courses that have missing assignments after June 6, 2014. This could impact student eligibility for Fall Sports because a student must pass a minimum number of courses or they are ineligible for the first 6 weeks of their **NEXT** sports season which could be basketball if the student does not participate in cross country.
4. Students who are on the ICU List on June 6, 2014 will not advance to the next grade level until all assignments are completed. Students will be assigned to the ICU Room in August to complete missing assignments before reporting to the next grade level for elementary grades. High school students will not receive a schedule for 2014-2015 until all assignments are completed for 2013-2014.

Students be sure you are not delayed at the beginning of the next school year by completing assignments NOW!!!

### Lower Level Repair Project:

The district is following protocol established by school board policy and the Emergency Operations Plan as we work to maintain school operations while work is scheduled to get the lower level back into condition as soon as possible. The students and employees are working together to make this difficult time a positive one. A big "thank you" goes out to parents who have worked with us to keep things running smoothly during the clean-up and restoration process. Rest assured that the safety of students and employees is the district's primary and utmost concern. Please contact the superintendent if you want additional information on the status of the project. District policy directs all inquiries to the superintendent's office because all related tribal, state, and federal entities are communicating with the superintendent on the status of the project and this avoids partial information being communicated.

# The Season of Winter Is Over

Her message was printed as follows:

*"My people were tough in those days...if in winter a person fell into icy water. He got out, took off his wet clothes, rolled in the snow, rubbing his body with it, and got warm. Then, after squeezing out the water, he put on his clothes and forgot about getting wet....the buffalo-runners rubbed their hands with snow and sand, so that their fingers would be nimble at handling the bow and arrows. Now my people wear gloves, and too many clothes. We are soft as mud.~Pretty Shield, Crow, C, 1925*

Even "Rooster" has great lessons that he tells in the MHA newspaper called "Prairie Chicken Tales." We learn and grow from the hardships in life and find we are closer to our family through the difficulties that allows us to come together.

What is intended purpose of strength and endurance is one of the greatest test yet that is still yet to come in the very near future. This is not to alarm or scare anyone, but it is to prepare for the Creator's Victory. In the Old Testament in the book of Amos 3:6,7 reads, "Shall a trumpet be blown in the city and the people not be alarmed and afraid? Shall misfortune or evil occur (as punishment) and the Lord has not caused it? Surely the Lord God will do nothing without revealing His secret to His servants the prophets."

Over time the Lord has revealed to me many dreams and visions, these I shared openly from time to time. I have also quoted many prophets who have revealed prophecies pertaining to our Nation and people. 

## Jesus' Teaches About Retaliation and Love of Enemies



In Jesus' sermon on the mount in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus gives a teaching about retaliation and love of enemies. Jesus said, "You have heard that it was said, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth. But I say to you, offer no resistance to one who is evil. When someone strikes you on your right cheek, turn the other one to him as well. If anyone wants to go to law over your tunic, hand him your cloak as well. 'Should anyone press you into service for one mile, go with him for two miles'" (Matthew 5:38-41).

I remember my very first day of school as a first grader. They didn't have kindergarten where I went to school. Some older boys were picking on my twin brother and me and I did the seemingly natural thing. I lashed out and fought back with my fists and grabbed onto their legs to try to pull them to the ground, just like I did at home with my brothers when we got into fights. You know, "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth." Right?

Needless to say, my brother and I as puny first graders didn't win that fight against those sixth graders, and our time in the principal's office was spent mulling over why we were there and how our wrestling moves failed us.

This story makes me laugh when I think back on it, but it continues to teach me a lesson, namely, it doesn't pay to retaliate.

When we do as Jesus tells us in the Gospel and "turn the other cheek" rather than hit back, then we have a better chance of turning a bully away and feeling better about ourselves. When we fight back it just gives the aggressor more reason to keep being stupid. To "turn the other cheek," however, in no way implies cowardice. In fact, it is a rather brave thing to do. You see, is someone backhands you with the right hand, your face turns to the left, and in order to turn the other cheek you need to look back at the person who hit you and face them again. This means you don't

run away, but stand strong while not stooping to the other's level and strike back, which is what we too often tend to do when we feel hurt. But hitting back, whether physically with our hands or verbally with our words, tends to dig a deeper hole in our relationship with the other person and brings no resolve. There is a better way, and it doesn't involve violence.

Jesus gives an example of how we should act toward others. He says, "Should anyone press you into service for one mile, go with him for two miles." Jesus is likely referring to the practice of Roman soldiers pressing others to carry their supplies for a mile, which the soldiers could not make someone carry his luggage more than one mile. They even had mile markers along the road to indicate the distance of a mile. So if someone voluntarily goes two

miles, the generosity and willingness displayed by that person would have certainly made a deep impression on the soldier. It may even have had the effect of softening a hardened and embittered heart. This was Jesus' way. He had gone the extra mile for us by dying on the cross and forgiving our sins, even though we don't really deserve it.

Jesus did not do the minimum for us and he did not fight back in the way that we too often fight back. Jesus' way of responding to abuse was to pray for his persecutors. In his sermon on the mount Jesus said, "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your heavenly Father, for he makes his sun rise on the bad and the good, and causes rain to fall on the just and the unjust."

In addition, Jesus teaches us to give forgiveness towards our enemies. On the cross Jesus said, "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do." Jesus wants us to do the same for others as is shown when he taught us the Our Father prayer, which says, "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." Do we forgive others who have hurt us, so that God can forgive us our offenses against him and others? Do we go the extra mile for others, rather than give our bare minimum? Do we turn the other cheek, rather than hit back with our fists or hurtful words? Let us ponder these questions and ask God's guidance and strength to do what he would have us do, that is, to "love our enemies" and "pray for those who persecute us."
