## West Segment Tribal Representative Update



Hello Community members and relatives.

Before I begin this month's update I would like to express my deepest condolences and sympathy to the families and relatives of; Susan Fox Riddle, Ted Bolman Jr., Faye Lone Fight, Wanda Wolf and Charlene Young Bear Charging. May our Creator God grant each of you comfort and peace in the loss of your

beloved ones.

Our Bakken Days here in our community went extremely well we had a great turn out. Our mud run was excellent and was the biggest event we had yet as far as participants and crowd wise. Something new we added this year was the ATV's and that was an added attraction to the mud run. The pow wow was also a great success we had a huge turn out for that. A lot of people commented on our fireworks display which was awesome to watch. We had a lot of activities such as kid games, tug of war. The high heel race which took place during the pow wow. We really had a good time and a great turn out at our Bakken days celebration and activities. I would like to see this continue on every year so our community will have something to look forward too. I know people are already looking forward to next years' Bakken days. I would like to thank my staff, without you guys our Bakken days wouldn't be successful, so I want to thank and acknowledge my staff here for their outstanding work during the Bakken days.

During the month of August the West Segment office will be furnishing school supplies to the kids. Our summer youth workers will be winding down, we are planning at a little finale for them maybe take them to a water park or something it would be nice to finish out their summer youth season.

On another note our Mandaree Inn is up and ready. The rooms are already sold out for the weekend of the Mandaree pow wow. This is our first time trying to provide for our community. Presently, Trena Baker is tentatively the Hotel Manager for the West Segment Development Corporation. We are all excited to see how the Mandaree Inn will go.

We had our last clean up day for our community, we cleaned up the pow wow grounds, we mowed lawns, picked up trash. Everyone worked hard to get it clean so when our visitors come our community would look nice. Everyone both adults and kids did a great job in cleaning up our community. Those who participated in all three clean ups received a incentive, parents will get a grand stand ticket and the kids will get mega passes for the state fair. These incentives are only for those who participated in all three clean ups. Our community is a little spoiled so this time we wanted them to earn their incentives.

Also the Mandaree One Stop addition for the new deli and the new pizza place has yet to being completed. The One Stop is coming along good as part of the addition we will have a big walk in cooler in there. There will also be a place for people to go and sit down in and eat. It will take some time but it will get done, the One Stop will be open for 24 hours for your convenience. Right now we are the only ones open in our area for 24 hours and the truckers and the people know that. Our only down fall is that semi trucks can't come into the Mandaree community. For that reason, it is so important for us to get this by pass built so the One Stop can sell gas to the semi truckers. This by pass will be located by the Black Eagle sub division which will come around and behind the store, we are still waiting on the BIA and that takes a while as we all know. I've been working on this awhile trying to get this by pass for our community so our sales will increase at the One Stop store. The elders payment went out on July 14 they also got an extra 400 so our elders each received a 1,000. I made the motion to increase the payment for our elders which was passed unanimous by our tribal council so now the elders will get 1,000 from here on out.

On another note, I would like the people to know that I made a statement at the Bakken days that the checks would be out on July 18. During our council meeting I asked the council why we weren't meeting the July 18 obligation. I was told they have to channel it through OST Office of Special Trustee's which will be a government check. They will do the disbursements but if they can't do it by August 1 or July 31st OST will give us a letter than we will disburse it from the general fund. We are almost positive that they won't meet our deadline so I am hoping to push these checks out sooner. The part that I disagreed with and I made it clear in this council meeting, If our disbursements reach up to 2,000 and if you owed the tribe they would deduct that monies. Meaning if you had an outstanding loan amount at the Small loans program than they would take that amount out. This will only happen if our disbursement reaches 2,000. They weren't clear on how their projected amounts would be increased so right now its 500. The part I don't agree with is if we are calling it a disbursement and give it out to the people, then why do we want to take it back. This isn't so much the tribal council it's mainly the Elders Alliance board they're the ones creating policy for the people's fund.

I went on record I made the motion for the council to rescind our pay increase and Fred second it vote taken and it passed unanimously. I wasn't at the meeting for the motion or the voting, I was at another obligation I had to do for my clan son, so I had to leave the meeting early. So I wasn't there when they did this increase, I heard about the next day and its kind of funny because of all a sudden they said the council got a big increase. So now we are back to the same. On the flip side of it like I told the council, we aren't sitting here doing nothing not that I'm complaining we want to justify our increase we have done a lot in each of our communities, every councilman has worked hard. I can only speak for our community, I brought in 30 homes and looking at another 30 homes, we are looking at scattered type homes. So we are trying to meet the needs of our community. We also helped the school out with a million dollars for their school housing, a new community center, and a veterans 20 unit apartment complex for our veterans, a new arbor for our pow wow.

## Around West Segment






# More on The Bakken Celebration

## Continue on Councilman Phelan's Update

So now the council is back to the normal salary. However, there are some employee's that are paid way higher than the council.

On another note many tribal employee's received an email about leave for the sun dances. So I asked our tribal representative to explain this. I want to clarify this the council stated that leave would only be allowed to a sun dance leader in order to claim leave for that time. We all know that if your practicing your religion than we all know you are not all leaders. To practice our Indian ways of life, so I made a motion to the council to take out that portion of our policies and procedures. So everyone can claim leave and you can get up to 40 hours of sun dance leave and this was clarified in our last council meeting.

As far as the Health card for everyone I am still pushing for that. I have another proposal done by a Colorado firm they are going to come forward and show us their proposal. I just want our people to know that I am still pursuing the health care cards. We have EMT's that will be here this week from Colorado, in fact they are bringing us our other ambulance which is a four wheel drive. All they are waiting on is their state certification for our area. The doctor is already state certified and we just have to be approved by the state health board to transport out of Mandaree. So right now we are just waiting on the certification. We are hoping to be in full swing by the end of August. The Killdeer ambulance will be here this weekend and they will be assisting us until we get state certified. So this weekend we will have an ambulance, EMT, EMR during our Mandaree celebration.

As far as the Mandaree bowery is concerned we are still searching for a crew. We are planning on taking care of this next week to demolish the old pow wow grounds. Once that is taken care of than we will move on in building a new bowery for next years celebration. We will tear down the old one because kids will eventually destroy it or vandalize it so we will just get rid of it. So this is still in the plan to get this done by next year.

On another project of our truck stop we are still waiting on our BIA permit as soon as we get our permit from the BIA then we are ready to go with the truck stop. I am told by August.

I would like to give an update on the spill that took place in Mandaree on July 8th north of our community. It was on the intake road. We had excellent responders from all our tribal departments. Cristwood that bought arrow pipeline so they're the main company right now dealing with this spill. We also have all our tribal entities; TERO, Tribal Energy, Tribal EPA, Natural Resources, Fish and

Game, Homeland security our MR&I Water department, our West Segment tribal office. So there were a lot of entities that were involved and they still are. Everyone is doing an excellent job and the spill was contained it didn't hit our water. The spill was stomped by some beaver dams but the wildlife is okay. I just went out there again yesterday and the beavers are fine they have pictures of them. We have people out there working 24 hours . In the dam there's also a big snapping turtle out there so the snapping turtle is alive and well. Right now they are flushing out the land and refurbished and tilled up the land and got the salt water out of the land up on top but they're still flushing down below to make sure all the brine is out of the infected area. So the flushing will go on for a least another week.

Before I close I would like to inform our community of two things; I want our elders to have a computer center in their building. So when they come to the elders center they can get on the computer, we will show them how to work the computers. I want them to have their own lap tops so this is what I want to do for our elders here in Mandaree. So my next assignment is to get lap tops for our elders. Right now, Bernadine Fredericks is on maternity leave so Monte Fredericks is filling in for her until she comes back to work.

I would also like to mention that Justin Deegan from Thunder Revolution Studio, LLC will be here during the Mandaree Celebration. He took some footage from the White Shield pow wow so he will do the same here at the Mandaree Celebration. He is doing a documentary on cultural preservation. He will be at the Little Shell pow wow as well. Justin will be documented the pow wows and elders throughout the documentary.

In closing, The 2014 Mandaree Celebration which is this weekend, I just want to say I hope everyone enjoyed themselves at this years pow wow. If you are traveling home have a safe trip. This paper will be out after the pow wow so I hope everyone had a safe and enjoyable time here in our segment.




