## Supplemental Agriculture Funding Included 2015 FY Budget From Oil & Gas Revenues

The intent of the Agriculture Program of the Mandan-Hidatsa-Arikara Nation is to help area cattle and horse owners supplement their winter feeds needs.

Although the winter was not too severe in terms of abundance of snow and long stretches of subzero temperatures.

The Tribal Business Council looked at the possibility of future hardships for the area ranchers in the upcoming winter. The council then approved in the 2015 budget with funding for supplemental feed to aid them. The West Segment Council Representative, Randy Phelan took the lead to include funding in the FY 2015 budget for cattle and horse owners reservation wide.

Mandaree area is where the majority of cattle and horse owners are concentrated, this is the hub for

distribution of 1,000 to 1,200 lbs., alfalfa and grass mix bales.

Ted Lone Fight III, Director recently added a survey and application form so he can get a closer estimation of supplemental feed for next FY 2016 budget planning, and the area in the most need is the west side of the reservation and contains the biggest Range Units.

1,000 bales were purchased to distribute to enrolled members the criteria for supplemental feed is: Enrolled member, cattle rancher operator, horse owner, sheep owner, hog owner, buffalo owner, and other species of livestock. The intent of the Tribal Business Council is to give priority to cattle owners. To provide an equal distribution is: Cattle owner; 10 bales, horse owner-5 bales, no matter how many animals at household.

## Hidatsa Housing Program Update

Hello the good people of “God’s Country”.

The Hidatsa Housing Program is continuing to evolve as we now have 28 residents moved into their new homes in the Black Eagle Phase I development. We have one home set aside for Law Enforcement and our final resident will move in soon.

We had a very informative and productive tenant meeting a few weeks ago at the Elder’s meal site. I was able to reiterate to our tenants the expectations with regards to timely rent payments, repairs etc. Then we had questions and answer session period and it was voiced that we need to install our street lighting for the safety of the residents, especially the children.

One concern that all residents also stated was the ATV and Mini Bike use in the development and the “excessive” speed on White Lodge Circle. I can say, I have personally gone to one of our homes and voiced your concerns. Please let the drivers know how you feel when this happens. We all have to take a stance for our safety.

Councilman Phelan also spoke that evening to show his continued support for the housing projects.

Many members of the community have asked the status of the White Oak Park and its completion date. As of this writing, work crews are tying in the plumbing and skirting the homes. It is my understanding that we are sill awaiting the installation of the transformer from McKenzie Electric and the final connection of the water lines with Fort Berthold Rural Water system.

Also, the West Segment Development Board has not as of this update made any selections for White Oak Park. It was my recommendation to the Board that we hold off on this until we have a concrete completion date so the time period between your notification and actually move in date is a very short period of time. The Board approved the rent at \$500 for these homes as well.

Effective immediately, all future tenants will now have to pay 1st and last month’s rent and a security deposit for a total move in amount of \$1,500 due at lease signing.

### New Town Main Street to be closed from ND Highway 1804 to Park Place starting May 14 as part of Main Street work

Beginning on Thursday, May 14, Main Street/ND Highway 23 will be closed to vehicle traffic between ND Highway 1804 and Park Place in New Town to allow crews to begin construction on the Main Street Reconstruction Project.

This project includes concrete overlay, roadway widening, shoulder reconstruction, storm drain reconstruction, curb and gutter reconstruction, sewer reconstruction and water main reconstruction, lighting and signals.

During this time:

- Flaggers will be in place to direct traffic.
- Motorists may experience delays.
- Local businesses will be open and accessible.

Motorists should expect varying traffic restrictions in the project area throughout the construction season.

The NDDOT Williston District serves the transportation needs of the communities in northwestern North Dakota, including Williston, Alexander, Watford City, New Town, Stanley, and Berthold.

To all hunters who have not filled out and handed in their Hunter Questionnaires for the Following Seasons: 2014 Deer Bow & 2014 Deer Gun

As stated in your proclamations:


“Complete and accurate information on the Hunter Questionnaires will greatly assist the Game & Fish Division in determining the number of deer harvested and the optimum number of permits that can be issued to maintain a stable, healthy deer population on the Reservation lands for future generations. Hunters are required to hand them in or send them to the Three Affiliated Tribes Game and Fish Division.

**This is mandatory and is to be handed in before March 31, 2015. Failure to comply with this stature will result in an extra fee and must be paid before a hunter will be eligible to participate in any subsequent hunting and/or fishing seasons.”**

**TAT Game and Fish has decided to extend the deadline to May 29, 2015 at 4:40 pm to hand in all 2014 Hunter Questionnaires. Please get these in as soon as possible.**

In the case of an emergency, the quickest way to get ahold of the Mandaree EMS (Ambulance) is to call 9-1-1. If you call 9-1-1, the dispatchers will page us to come. It's ok to call 9-1-

-1 even if you're not sure if it's an emergency. As an ambulance service, we'd rather come by and not be needed than to be needed and to not come. Calling 9-1-1 is better because if we're visiting a patient or we are on call, we won't be able to answer our phones. If we're out of service, transporting a patient, the dispatchers will be able to send another ambulance if necessary.

For business purposes, it's ok to call our business phone at 421-1357. Also, after calling 9-1-1, you can call the business phone to explain where your house is. If there is no answer on the business phone, it's possible that we are treating a patient and that we aren't able to answer the phone.



Children are to be cherished, loved, nurtured, affirmed, validated, etc., but in the real world we find the very opposite to be true. Children are being abandoned, under the most horrible conditions for weeks on end often times with no food available. This is going on across Indian Country and is on an increase due to the drugs and alcohol that permeate our reservations.

The worst and most heart breaking situations that have occurred and still occur during the abandonment of children is they become victims of sexual abuse and become scarred for life. I wish I could write about a more upbeat and encouraging society, but together we have to work for a better future and tomorrow for our children, it is not just going to happen overnight. We must stop denying the facts and telling ourselves that this is not happening in my family, when the reality is that is the very reason our loved ones are in bondage to drugs and alcohol, desperately trying to silence the angry voices in their heads that remind them of the abuse and neglect that has occurred and continues to occur in the next generation.

If all the strong praying mothers, grandmothers; families got together and began to pray for "Spiritual Healing" to help bring our people back into balance, we would once again be a strong nation as our ancestors and strong "Spiritual Leaders" believed we are to be. We have many revivals and prayer meetings that have taken place throughout our

reservation and I thank God and continue to thank God for all those prayers and meetings, without them we would be in a far worse condition that we could be in. They have been holding back the evil forces that are trying to take over our nation and people. 

# Memorial



With Memorial Day being celebrated at the end of May, I thought I would focus on the word “Memorial”. The Webster Dictionary’s definition of memorial is: (1) serving to preserve remembrance; commemorative (2) or relating to memory. As a noun it defines memorial as something that keeps remembrance alive: as (a) monument, (b)

something (as a speech or ceremony) that commemorates, © keepsake or memento. Made in the image and likeness of God we were given the ability to remember. Hence we try to remember all sorts of things~ events, people, places, ect. In order to honor and not to forget the Americans who fought and died in the Civil War, in 1868 on May 30th Decoration Day was established. Later, this day would be known as Memorial Day. In the late 19th century honor and remembrance expanded to include all deceased veterans who died in war. In order to ‘preserve remembrance’, families annually visit war memorials and military cemeteries and annually attend ceremonies that honor those veterans who gave the ultimate sacrifice for America.

Memorializing the deceased or special events isn’t new. It was done by building the great pyramids years before Christ was born and it has been done by remembering martyred Christians since Christ was crucified. But for the Jewish People and Catholics who memorialized events surrounding God in ceremonies or rituals such as Exodus from the slavery under the Egyptians or the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, the word “memorial” has additional meaning. Not only do the Jewish people and Catholics remember annually, monthly or weekly what God has done for them in ceremonies or rituals, God also calls them to enter into the event regularly and personally experience it within the ceremony or ritual. For the Jewish people, when they celebrate their annual Passover or Seder Meal they are to not only remember the story of their ancestors’ exodus from Egypt when they participate in their annual Passover or Seder Meal but they are to experience their redemption from Egypt in the same way that the

Jewish slaves experience it. For Catholics when they celebrate Mass weekly, they are to not only remember the story of how Christ lived among us, of how he willingly offered himself to be crucified and to die for the redemption of our sin and conquer death in his resurrection, but they are to experience the redemption from sin in the same way that the early Christians experienced it.

This added meaning to the word “memorial” is only made possible because it is within a ceremony, within a sacred action commanded yearly, monthly or weekly by God~of the Seder Meal God commanded. *“This day will be a day of remembrance for you,...you will celebrate it as a statute forever” (Exodus 12:14);* of the Last Supper/Seder or Mass Jesus said. *“Do this in memory of me” (Luke 22:19).* For Catholics, when we go to weekly Mass in the year 2015 and enter into this sacred action by using our memory to recall the event that saved us some 2000 years ago, that is the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, we enter *(by the work of the Holy Spirit)* into and participate in Jesus’ action of saving us and personally experience salvation, personally experience being saved.

Yes, Memorial Day will soon be upon us. Let us not only remember and honor those veterans who died for America but let us also participate in a sacred action commanded by God and allow the Holy Spirit to draw us deeply into participating with Jesus who by his life, death and resurrection brought us salvation to our deceased veterans, to us who live here and now and to the entire world.

His concern for the safety of those who had to enter the school building during the harsh winter months, Terry would clear all the walkways in the school building before anyone arrived and would also go out early in the mornings to shovel sand onto all the icy patches on the highway into Mandaree.




