West Segment Tribal Representative Update



Hello Community Members, relatives and friends. Our weather here in North Dakota has been really nice but we also are having our share of some needed rain showers. First of all, I would like to comment on our horse sale that we recently in our West Segment community. Which I must say is our very first horse sale. Our weather was cold so we had the horse sale right inside the community center. It turned out really well we had over seventy horses that came through. We had horses and buyers that came from Minnesota, Montana and South Dakota. We had a lot of riding horses that came through and loose horses. This was one of the items that our people wanted in our community to buy and sell horses. Lorraine Howe coordinated this and she did an outstanding job. We had a lot of help from people in our community who helped out setting up the panels. We also had a sale on tack so a lot of people in our community had an opportunity to sell their items. Overall, it was a good thing for the community and this is the first time in history we got to have our very own horse sale here in Mandaree. A great mile stone and we would like to continue everyone would like to see another horse sale in the fall.

On another note, we just got done with our Memorial Day celebration and we had an excellent turn out. It was a three day celebration everyone had a good time. We had a lot of specials and some adoption ceremonies that took place during the celebration, which is good for our clans. We had a lot of dancers who came from all over Manitoba, Denver, Kansas, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Canada to name a few. We had some outstanding drum groups; for our singing contest; 1st- Show Time, 2nd- Young Buxs, 3rd- High Noon, 4th- Battling Horse. We had a lot of specials that people came forth and did in honor of their veterans. We had a good time during the full weekend, and I know our One Stop store did good this weekend as far as sales.

This celebration impacted our community in a good way. We also had feeds throughout the weekend, I want to thank the West Segment Staff who all did an outstanding job bringing their food to feed the people and setting up everything and getting all the tables set up for the feeds. All the staff helped out all weekend. I was really pleased with our staff and I wanted to let the people know we have an outstanding staff here.

Other upcoming events we are still planning the Bakken Days event but we will let you know in the June paper if we will have it or not because this year the 4th of July is on a week day. Also, on behalf of West Segment we gave new bikes to all the Head Start graduates, and we gave the 8th grade graduates some money and also to the Seniors who graduated from Mandaree. The 8th grade and seniors all got some monies from West Segment we are proud of all of them for graduating.

As far as our Nathan Goodiron Veterans Assistance Living Building as you can see construction is underway we are hoping this building will be done by August if weather cooperates, we have a lot of rain here so it would depend on the weather. The building shouldn't take long all they have to do is put it together. The electric company is now moving power lines, so we are hopeful again to be moving people into the White Oak park very soon, but that also depends on the weather and it's been raining here. So it makes it hard, we will soon have thirty eight trailer homes that will be available to community members. As far as the Tribal Business council, we are planning another distribution, I am hoping during the Mandaree Celebration but we will see how things go by then. As a council, we have already budgeted our distributions for our communities so I am going to push for July to get this distribution out. Also, just to let the people know starting today, in our community we will be taking summer youth applications all this week and by Friday they will select. Next week they will start working I believe we will have twenty youth working. Also the Mandaree Elders will be going on their trip on June 6 through June 9th for their annual trip to Deadwood, South Dakota, White Shield will be going in with our elders. This is all I have for now, so everyone be safe out there and drive careful now that school is out.

Hiraaca Elders



The Elder Program staff are continuing with the services as needed while preparing to meet the stated goals of the program. At our recent Elder Board meeting the Program Director updated the Board on some of the

planning and the changes that are needed.

The trip to Deadwood is scheduled for June 6th to June 9th. There are many events that are going on in the community as well as in Deadwood.

The Elder Board has expressed concern based on input from the elders who do not attend these trips that we are not providing extra services to them. We are working on some activities for those elders who do not wish to travel and maybe plan something here at the Elders site such as birthday celebration meals, bingo and trips to local towns such as Minot, Dickinson or Williston.

One event we will be transporting elders too is the naming and dedication ceremony at the Hidatsa Heritage Center located at 420 N. Ave, Stanton, ND on June 8 at 2:00pm (Central Standard Time). The Program Director will be printing out a flyer and agenda along with the times of departure and arrival to and from the Hidatsa Heritage Center. A traditional meal is scheduled to follow the program activities.

Another event the Elder Board will coordinate is to bring a nutritionist in to assist the elders in preparing and eating meals that are healthy and fill the needs of many of our elders who are diabetic. In discussion it was agreed that many of the foods we have are too salty, too much fat or too much sugar. We would like to be more informed at cooking and purchasing healthier foods for the elders.

This event will also be sent in flyers once we schedule someone to come in.

Also keep in mind that the Elders Program will be planting a garden sometime this week.

Many times the staff are out in the field delivering meals, working with elders or in the New Town office processing paperwork for services. So we ask you to leave a message on the phone or if you need to speak to someone immediately, these are the cellular phone numbers we have:






The clanship system is based on the mother's lineage, you are your mother's clan. The line continues and perpetuates from the mother. The Hiraaca's rely on having daughters to ensure the perpetuity of the clans and people.

The clanship system among the Hiraaca's is an essential part of the culture. The clan system defines who are the members and what role a member has in the tribe. The clan system also defines how one must conduct her/himself within the family, clan or tribe. The clan member's roles includes; helpfulness, graciousness, protection, educating guidance, nurturing and discipline.

The gifts given to your father's clan is in respect, honor, and preparation for the spirit world. The gifts are symbolic of what you will take into the spirit world. Your father's clan brother or clan sister, who are your clan father (Aadu) and clan aunt (Ishaawi) will be chosen to be the person to send you into the spirit world. The Modern title for this is senior pallbearer.

In any honoring or giveaway ceremony that you do you always acknowledge your clan father (Aadu) and clan aunt (Ishaawi) with the upmost respect, beloved and treasured clan father and aunt. You are a child of your father's clan. The one donating or giving away does not give away to your mother's clan, unless your mother and father are from the same clan.

The gifts and the war bonnet are to be hung by the family of the deceased person at the wake. The deceased person will share the gifts with all relatives and friends awaiting for the arrival in the spirit world.

The senior pallbearer helpers are responsible to take all the gifts down before sunrise of the fourth day.

Hiraaca Clanships

Both tribes are "Matrilineal" which means a system in which decent is traced through the mother and maternal ancestor. If your mother is a member of the Hiraaca and Mandan tribe; then you are a member of your mother's clan. Always remember, you are what your mother is. Here is an example; if your father is a Prairie Chicken than you are a Prairie Chicken child or nagaa (meaning baby), you don't belong to your father's clan, again you are what your mother is. This is only on your father's side; his clan brothers and sisters are your clan aunt (ishaawi) and clan father (aadu).

This is on your mother's side, when you select a clan child for the war bonnet dance you choose a child of your clan brother or clan sister. For example; (when selecting someone; if you are a flint knife clan member than you will select one of your brother's children, you look for a baby knife clan (nagaa). Same way with your clan sister, you select a baby knife (nagaa). The clan aunt (ishaawi) and clan father (aadu) will ask their clan children for help, they will call on their clan children to be on a war bonnet dance. Also they will call on their clan children to be on the pow wow committee. This is how its supposed to be done, but now a days people just pick their own families.

Your always use your father's side, when you have a giveaway ceremony, you give to your clan father and clan aunt the best of what you have in honor and respect for them.

Again you go through your father's clan when you select a senior pallbearer, you choose your clan father or clan sister on your father's side. Your father (aadu) and (ishaawi) are the ones who send the deceased person on their journey to the spirit world. For example; (if a senior pallbearer from the chicken clan is called upon than it is his clan that helps him throughout the entire time. If he/she needs a break only a member of the chicken clan (his clan) should be the one to relieve him/her so the senior pallbearer can take a break.

Hiraaca Clanships Continue

Your father (aadu) and (ishaawi) are the ones who send the deceased person on their journey to the spirit world. The gifts hung on the line behind the casket are put up by the family and these gifts are what the deceased takes spiritually to the spirit world to share with their family and relatives on the other side. If your parents are from the same clan, for example; say your father is flint knife and your mother is flint knife, than you are considered a genuine flint knife clan member. So when you donate or have a giveaway or have to select a senior pallbearer than you still go through your father's clan, which in this example is flint knife clan.

Our people were taught to respect and love your clan father and clan aunt, because these clan relatives are responsible for your guidance, discipline, protection and wellbeing, and most of all

they will be the one to take care of you when you make your journey to the spirit world.

You only give or (donate) to your father's clan brother, clan father (aadu) and clan aunt (ishaawi). You do not donate or giveaway to your mother's clan.

If your wife or husband is not from our Mandan/Hiraaca tribe, your children will not belong to a clan or be a child of a clan, only if you have your wife or husband adopted into the Three clan or Four clan. For a woman; if she marries a non-tribal member and she has sisters who are married into our tribe than her children can go through her sister's husband's clan. For example; (if a mother belongs to the flint knife clan her children are flint knife, but her husband is from another tribe. Than her children can go through her sister's husband, say for example he belongs to the Water Buster clan, than her children can use his clan.

Another way is; (as a child or naga (baby) if you don't have any sisters or any other family then you can go through your grandfather or your mother's husband clan, (if they have a clan). This is all done on your mother's side. For example; (if your grandfather on your mother's side belongs to the Water Buster clan then you can go through his clan). Or if you have a grandfather who was adopted in a clan, than you go through the clan he was adopted in. For example; (if your mother's husband belongs to the chicken clan then you can go through the chicken clan. Or if your mother's husband was adopted than you can go through the clan that he was adopted in. If you don't have any sisters or any other family, then you can go through your grandfather on your mother's side; or your mother's husband clan.

This is what we were told by the old ones.


2016 Little Plume Graduation



Rainbow Smelt-Die-Off Occurring in Lake Sakakawea

A fish kill affecting adult rainbow smelt is ongoing in portions of the upper half of Lake Sakakawea, according to Dave Fryda, Missouri River System fisheries supervisor for the North Dakota Game and Fish Department.

Fryda said the cause of the die-off has been documented numerous times in North Dakota in the past. The vast majority of the dead and dying smelt have physical signs of Columnaris bacteria, said Fryda, we've recovered infected fish from White Earth Bay downstream to Deepwater Bay and Van Hook Arm.

Columnaris bacteria are present in all water bodies, and outbreaks typically occur when rapid water temperature changes occur at a time when the fish are stressed, such as after spawning. The smelt recently spawned in Lake Sakakawea, and were recovering from that stress when we experienced near record-high temperatures last week which boosted the water temperature in the shallow bays where the smelt spawned, Fryda added.

Smelt affected by Columnaris often develop visible skin irritations that have the appearance of fuzz or mold. Although there is no known cause for concern when in physical contact with these fish, the department suggests to leave the fish alone.

Lake Sakakawea has not had a widespread smelt die-offs since the mid to late 1980's, a time when the overall smelt population was very high. Fryda said the current smelt population is the highest its been for decades, so that is likely part of the reason the bacteria has spread over such a wide area.

The overall significance of this years die-off will likely be minimal, however, Fryda said the effects on the population won't be known until later this summer when fisheries crews assess the adult smelt population.



Passover to Pentecost



The word "Pentecost" comes from an Old English word that came from a Latin word that came from a Greek word that described a Jewish celebration of when God, through Moses on the fiftieth (penta) day after their departure from Egypt, gave the Jewish people the gift of the Law on Mt. Sinai (the Ten Commandments).

Because these events were so important, God told the Jewish people to never forget. Never forget the events that led to their departure from Egypt, the events that freed them from the slavery of the Egyptians. Never forget how God sent the Destroyer to slaughter all the firstborn males in Egypt. Never forget how God instructed the Destroyer to pass over the Hebrew first born males of the families who put the blood of the lamb on their lintel and two doorposts. Never forget when God gave them the Ten Commandments on the fiftieth day. Never forget! And for centuries after these events the Jewish people make a point every year to actively remember these events by not only recalling them to mind but re-living them as if they themselves were there again doing it again. To this day, every year the Jewish people celebrate their departure from Egypt they now call Passover. And fifty days after Passover, every year they celebrate the Giving of the Law they now call Pentecost.

Jesus too entered into these yearly celebrations throughout his life, however when Jesus celebrated his last Passover, he modified both celebrations a little— well actually a lot. At the last supper, which is Jesus celebrating the Passover with his disciples, you can hear elements of the Passover— cup of wine, bread, meal. However, as the meal progresses Jesus begins to refer to his body, his blood and then Jesus interrupts the meal by going to the Mount of Olives and eventually to the Cross on Calvary. When hanging on the cross Jesus says, "It is finished." (Jn 19:30) What is "it"? Could it be that Jesus is referring to the Passover meal? Jesus becomes the Lamb that is slain. His blood flowed from his side— sprinkled on the lintel and doorposts of the world. It is his blood that snatches away the

destroyer's power to take life. He is the Lamb eaten at the Passover meal, the bread we eat at communion. "Behold the Lamb of God. Behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb" (words spoken at every Mass when the priest holds up the host over the cup).

In becoming the Lamb of the Passover, Jesus changes the focus of the two celebrations. Instead of celebrating, recalling to mind, re-living the events surrounding the departure from Egypt, we now celebrate, recall to mind, re-live the events surrounding Jesus' celebration of his last Passover that led to our freedom from the slavery to sin imposed on us not by the Egyptians but by the evil one. Christians renamed this celebration Easter.

And what about Pentecost? How did Jesus change this celebration? If we take a general look at what happens to the Law given by God on Mt. Sinai, we see a movement from the tablets to the heart. King David mentions that the law of God is "within my heart" (Ps 40:8) and at the time of the Prophet Jeramiah God says "this is the covenant which I will make the house of Israel,....I will put my law within them and write it upon their hearts." (Jer 31:33) With the focus of God's Law being written upon our hearts, there is a need to remember the Law and interpret the Truth of the Law. So before Jesus ascends into heaven he tell his disciples "the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and will remind you of everything I have told you," "He will guide you into all the truth." (Jn 14:26, 16:31) So instead of celebrating, recalling to mind, re-living the events surrounding the Giving of the Law on Mt. Sinai, Christians now celebrate, recall to mind and summon through prayer the assistance of the Holy Spirit to remind us of the Law, to teach us the Truth about God's Law and to guide us so we can live by God's Laws that are written upon our heart. "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." (Mt.28:19-20).




