Hiraaca Elders



Greetings to all the community members from the Hiraaca Elders and Program staff. We have been busy planning summer activities for the elders which include finalizing the Deadwood trip on July 18-21, 2016.

Notices have been sent out to all elders on our mailing list for the sign up and rooming list.

In addition, we are planning an Elder Appreciation Day on July 14th at 5pm to show appreciation for our elders in the communities. We are working on the agenda and finalizing the program events. An emphasis is the elders who have lived in the community their entire lives and have contributed to the Hiraaca in some way. We will be doing small information gatherings on thirteen elders who are seventy-five (75) and older. Once the agenda and program events are finalized we will be sending out posters and flyers.

The Hiraaca Elder Board has had regular scheduled meetings on program planning and elder input which is really valued for program planning on how we can meet the needs of our elders. We have had meetings on May 18th, June 16th and one is scheduled for July 5th to finalized planning for the Elders Appreciation. The elders staff wish to thank the board for their time and commitment to ensuring that elders requests and needs are met.

Notices have been sent out to all Elders with a mailing list of Mandaree addresses on the Deadwood trip requesting that you come in and sign up for the trip. We are going by first come first serve as we have 35 rooms reserved for this event. We have had some concerns expressed for those elders who do not or cannot attend these social functions so we are setting up another social event for those who do not attend the trip. Also, we have had suggestions on a social event to coincide with the elder disbursements in July. One event we would like to plan for is a boat ride on the Casino Yacht for elders. Please let me know if this is an event you would like to

participate in.

Other activities include the West Segment Transportation Director, Mr. Dan Hunts Along who took time out to do plowing for our elders who needed gardens plowed. Thank you Dan. Also, we want to thank the Program staff (Roni Stiffarm) and volunteers who are doing the garden for the elders. We are battling thistles daily so we can produce fresh vegetables for our elders.

Other recommendations include doing two driver runs so the elders get their meals in a timely manner. To meet this goal, we are having the other truck fixed and once this is done we can do the two runs so they get their meals sooner. Also, we have scheduled a elder bingo during the July 1st Bakken Days at 1:00 o'clock which will be a 20 game prize bingo. Flyers will be posted as well as included in the poster for the Annual Bakken Days Events.






Larry White also introduced himself in his language to the people.

Dr. Lanny Real Bird addressed the audience and talked about our languages.



Montana Senator Jonathan Windy Boy gave a presentation about Native Language revitalization legislation in Montana that he got that passed.



Earl Bullhead shared how he implemented his songs into our language for students. For example; the wheels on the bus go round and round which he sang in his language, the kids learned that song fast.

The presenters and the hosts of the Language Symposium was outstanding, all of them shared so much knowledge of their languages. There were Immersion schools there with their students who spoke their language which was awesome to hear the young ones speaking their language.

Dr. Lanny Real Bird had the teachers stand up from Crow and he acknowledged them. He said they were very important resources that more teachers are needed who speak the language. He stressed that we need to keep our ways, as he states; "we need to build a trail so our trail can get wider for us and soon that trail will grow and become a road". He also stated that anyone can go along ways on our ceremonial ways, "we are not nomads, we have medicine and medicine bundles. Our people knew when we were going to have berries or not. We need to protect our native languages. Learn the language by listening to people; we didn't have an alphabet; we should be able to listen and converse. The need is with our culture base, we have to include our culture. We have to plan to create a road to get there, we as a people can coordinate this and move forward".

Montana Senator Jonathan Windy Boy, introduced and passed Native Language revitalization Legislation in the state of Montana. A question was asked how he did this and how he came about it? Jonathan just pointed at his head and said he thought of it wrote down his thoughts and asked various educators and resource people into his office and gave them a week to come up with ideas of what they could do or to add to what he had. He said it takes a lot of networking, according to Jonathan he stated they had many native schools in the state, so he needed all of their support, the council support a long with state support. With all his networking and from the help of his people. Jonathan was successful in getting this bill passed.

In closing remarks of the symposium, West Segment Councilman Phelan addressed everyone to take a picture together. He stated he would take the picture and have it into a poster and take it to NCAI. He stated he would submit a resolution for the emergency need of preserving our native languages. All the people put their hands together and applauded they were very happy to hear that. Another vision of Councilman Phelan is to have this done in the state of North Dakota as it is done in the state of Montana.

Remembering What The Old Ones Said

Just a few things that the old ones said. I remember them saying....

People nowadays have no respect for one another, not just the people, but for other things like the eagle feathers, war bonnets, eagle plumes and the eagle staff.

The old ones said only the veterans that went across the big water and were in battle, they have the rite to carry the eagle staff and lead the people during grand entry into the circle and to wear the war bonnet during a parade. Nowadays just anybody wears the war bonnet to go parading around. So have respect for the veterans they are the ones who crossed the big waters to do battle for our freedom so that we all can enjoy the celebrations (pow wows). This is what the old ones said.

In naming there is a ceremony to naming a person you cook the food, and give tobacco and sweet grass and a few blankets. The food you give to the good spirits, you pray for the person getting named and you say the person that's being named when you pray. When the person passes away the spirits will acknowledge the person's name and that is what the senior pallbearer will say. The persons name when sending the person home to the spirit world. That's the reason why we have names while we are alive. It was unheard of to name a person after they passed away.

The spirit world will not acknowledge the person.

Adoption:

You cannot adopt a person that have a clan already this is unheard of as the old ones say.

Women and girls can wear war bonnets when asked or called on from their clan father (aadu) and clan aunt (Isahaawi) for help on the war bonnet dance.

To wear a eagle plume and eagle feathers there is a ceremony for that. A veteran, clan father or their brothers have the rite to tie them on their hair and to do the tying in public or have someone witness the tying.

Just a few don't s that I remember. As some of the old ones said.

We say its not right, some say we're losing our ways. We are doing wrong, but no one is trying to let each other know. So its in our newspaper now.

Three Affiliated Tribes Fire Management

Do you have what it takes to be a wildland firefighter? Wildland firefighters are required to work up to 16 hours a day. Required to be physically fit, and follow a strict chain of command. If you the outdoors and enjoy traveling to remote areas this could be an adventure for you with good pay. With opportunity to grow and serve your community.

Requirements are first you must pass a physical fitness challenge a 3 mile walk in 45 minutes with 45 lbs on your back. If you succeed you will be selected to attend rookie training.

2016 Pay scale: First year firefighter: \$17.60 per hour.

Squad Boss: \$19.40 per hour.

Crew Boss: \$23.28 per hour.

A crew consists of twenty (20) firefighters: 1 crew boss 3 or 4 Squad Bosses, 15 or 16 firefighters with limit of 5 first year fire fighters.

Engine Boss: \$23.28 per hour

Engine Crew Member: \$17.60 per hour

An engine crew consists of three member-1 Engine boss and two crew members.

Requirements:

Drug Screen Arduous Pack test– a pack test is a timed test where a 45 pound pack is carried for three miles in less than 45 minutes.

Completion of S-130, S190 Jobs for first year fire fighters.

Prescribed Fire Dispatch, Fire Watch, Engine Crew Member

TAT Head Start Program

The Three Affiliated Head Start Program would like to announce their 2016-2017 Round Up Event for Returning and new students. We will be recruiting students whose birthday falls between August 1, 2011 and August 25, 2013. **This event is open to ALL CHILDREN between the ages of 2 1/2 to 5 years of age and is not restricted to any tribal affiliation or ethnicity.**

Parents need to bring proof of birth, income verification, and immunization records in the event that any immunizations were given out of the state of North Dakota. Please note that custodial parents/guardians must be present for medical liability reasons.

The Round Up will include the following services: Physicals, Immunizations, screenings for dental, and diabetes as well as services and information from other programs that involve children.

The event will be scheduled from 9am to 3pm for all communities. Families are encouraged to attend whichever location and date that suits them best and are not limited to their home segment. The scheduled days are as follows:

- **Monday, July 11:** Parshall Center at the Parshall Head Start Center building.
- **Tuesday, July 12:** White Shield Center at the WS Field Clinic/Senior Citizen Center building.
- **Thursday, July 14:** Twin Buttes Center at the Twin Buttes Field Clinic.
- **Monday, July 18:** Mandaree Center at the Mandaree Field Clinic
- **Monday & Tuesday July 25th & 26th:** New Town Center at New Town Head Start Center building.

Food and drinks will be provided and incentives will be given to families that complete the application process and are qualified for Head Start Enrollment. We can currently service 163 children for the 2016-2017 school year. Returning students will be given priority placement upon completion of application process. **PLEASE NOTE THAT RETURNING STUDENTS ARE REQUIRED TO COMPLETE THE APPLICATION PROCESS BEFORE CLASS PLACEMENT AND PRIORITIZATION.**

Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over Statewide Enforcement in June

Driving while under the influence of alcohol needs to stop—that's the message from North Dakota law enforcement and the North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT). Throughout the month of June, fifty law enforcement agencies across the state will participate in the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign, by adding extra patrols to be on alert for impaired drivers to keep our roads safe.

Consuming alcohol reduces your ability to distinguish objects, especially at night, even when under the legal limit of .08 blood alcohol content (BAC). To publicize this increased enforcement and bring awareness to the severity of this driving behavior, NDDOT is introducing the **"Blurred Lines"** campaign.

"Blurred vision is a visual theme in our campaign—but we want to emphasize that you need to hand over the keys long before it comes to that," said Karin Mongeon, Safety Division Director at NDDOT. "The point at which you decide to have a sober driver shouldn't be blurred either. It needs to be clear that if you plan to drink alcohol, designate a sober driver before you start drinking."

Along with the North Dakota Highway Patrol (NDHP), participating law enforcement agencies in the southwest region include the Stark County Sheriffs Department, Adams County Sheriffs Department, the Dickinson Police Department and the Killdeer Police Department.

"We'll have additional enforcement on the roads to discourage motorists from driving after drinking," said Captain David Wilkie of the Dickinson Police Department. "If you plan ahead, you can still enjoy a social evening—without blurring the lines between right and wrong. Designate a sober driver or call for a ride home if you plan to drink alcohol."

Last year in North Dakota, 44 percent of all fatalities in motor vehicle crashes were alcohol related. From 2005 to 2014, an average of about 62 people a year died in crashes in North Dakota where alcohol was involved. These are lives that could have been saved as driving under the influence is 100 percent preventable. Health Department Urges Public to Take Steps to Prevent West Nile Virus

The North Dakota Department of Health (NDDoH) reminds residents of the importance of protecting themselves and their families from mosquito bites. While there have not been any human cases of West Nile reported to the NDDoH so far this year, the department expects that it will be only a matter of time before the first case is identified.

Most people infected with West Nile virus experience no symptoms or have only mild symptoms, such as fever and headache. However, the more serious form of the illness, West Nile neuroinvasive disease, can cause symptoms of high fever, severe headaches, stiff neck, altered mental status, and death. People over age 50 or those who have underlying health issues are at greater risk for developing the neuroinvasive disease than others.

“West Nile virus is a concern in North Dakota. In 2015, 23 North Dakota residents tested positive for West Nile virus. Eight of those people were hospitalized, and one person died,” said Michele Feist, epidemiologist with the NDDoH. “West Nile virus disease can affect anyone and cause serious illness regardless of age. Last year, the family of the young woman who died from West Nile virus publicly acknowledged her death to raise awareness about the seriousness of West Nile virus and how to prevent the disease.

- Preventing mosquito bites is the most effective way to avoid West Nile

virus disease.

There is no human vaccine for West Nile virus, and there are no specific treatments for the disease. NDDoH recommends residents take these precautions to avoid mosquito bites:

- Use insect repellent registered with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) that contains ingredients such as DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus (or PMD) or permethrin. Always follow the directions on the manufacturers label for safe

and effective use.

- **Wear long sleeved shirts, long pants, and socks when outdoors.**
- **Limit outdoor activities between dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most likely to bite.**
- **Eliminate stagnant water in containers around homes where mosquitoes can lay their eggs (e.g., gutters, buckets, flower pots, old tires, wading pools, and birdbaths).**
- **Keep mosquitoes from entering your home by installing or repairing screens on windows and doors.**

In addition to human surveillance, the NDDoH West Nile virus surveillance program will include trapping and testing mosquitoes, reporting and testing sick animals, monitoring illness in humans and reporting and testing dead birds. How frequent Should I Visit The Dentist

According to the American Dental Association every person's oral needs are different and can change throughout their lifetime. Therefore there is no fixed answer, but there is a general rule of thumb. When it comes to dental exams and professional cleanings you should make plans to visit your dentist twice a year or every 6 months for a dental cleaning and thorough dental examination. This practice can help maintain oral hygiene, prevent many dental diseases, and unnecessary tooth pain; which gives everyone something to smile about! Call Elbowoods Dental at (701) 627.7927 to set up your exam/cleaning appointment.

What Happens at your visit? There are 2 parts to a regular visit. One part is the exam. The other is the cleaning.

The Check-up:

During the exam the dentist will evaluate any x-rays taken, check for cavities/oral concerns and diseases that need attention, and determine what type of cleaning is right for you.

The Cleaning:

The cleaning involves specialized instruments and a machine that uses high frequency sound waves/water to remove hardened plaque/tartar that cannot be removed by brushing or flossing at home. Next, a special flavored paste will be used to polish your teeth to remove any remaining plaque or stains. In the final steps the teeth will be flossed and a fluoride treatment will be placed.

The length of your cleaning may vary on your treatment needs.

What you should do between visits:

Be sure to take care of your teeth and gums between regular dental visits. Plaque is always forming on your teeth, but you can get rid of it by brushing and flossing regularly. Here are some tips for good oral care at home.

- Brush your teeth at least twice a day. Use toothpaste that contains fluoride.
- Floss at least once a day.
- Use a mouth rinse to help reduce the amount of bacteria in your mouth. This will also help to freshen breathe.


