



Motorists to Use Caution and Share The Road With Farm Equipment During Harvest

Harvest season is underway throughout the State and the North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT) is urging motorists to use caution as large farm equipment is out on the roadways this time of year

“Motorists should be extremely cautious as they drive, especially on rural, two-lane roads, as slow moving farm equipment is out on the roadways,” says Mark Nelson, NDDOT Deputy Director. “Most crashes are due to inattention, speeding, and unsafe passing. When approaching farm equipment, motorists need to pay attention, slow down and pass with extreme caution.”

Farm equipment is very large and heavy making it extremely difficult for operators to accelerate, slow down and stop. These vehicles also have large blind spots, making it difficult for operators to see approaching vehicles.

In 2015, there were 54 crashes in North Dakota involving farm equipment. “By taking extra precautions on the roadway and safely sharing the road with farm equipment, crashes can be prevented,” stresses Nelson.

Motorists are reminded to:

- Watch for mud and debris on the roadway as trucks go directly from the field onto the highway.
- Be aware that you can encounter farm equipment at any time of the day.
- Drive with headlights on at all times.
- Wear seatbelts.

In addition, farmers are reminded of the opportunity to get 10 percent extra weight permits that can be issued to expedite the first haul of farm products during harvest and for the collection and transport of sugar beets and potatoes. Additionally, farmers should be aware that road construction projects are finishing up this time of year as well. Some roads may be inaccessible to large farm equipment.

Farm equipment operators should consider the following precautions:

- Use lights and flashers to make equipment more visible.
- Use slow moving emblems on equipment traveling less than 30 mph.
- Consider using a follow vehicle when moving equipment, especially at night.

North Dakota Department of Transportation Alerts Residents of Telephone Consumer Fraud Scam

The North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT) is alerting North Dakota residents about fraudulent telephone calls claiming to be from representatives of the Motor Vehicle Division. Residents have reported receiving phone calls that their registrations are overdue followed by instructions on how to make a payment.

The NDDOT does NOT make this type of phone call about Motor Vehicle registrations. This is a scam, designed to trick the recipient into giving out information and payment to a scam artist.

Extra DUI Patrols in June resulted in 118 Alcohol & Drug related Arrests and Citations

Law enforcement patrols across the state worked more than 1,030 overtime hours for the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign during the month of June. These extra patrols resulted in 933 traffic stops across North Dakota with 118 arrests and/or citations for other alcohol related. These numbers reflect the totals reported from 36 of the participating law enforcement agencies, including the North Dakota Highway Patrol.

A total of 564 citations were attributed to the added patrols with 69 citations accounting for driving under the influence (DUI) arrests or refusal of a test. There were another 24 arrests or citations for other alcohol related violations and 25 drug related arrests. Tickets for speeding were the largest segment of the citations at 197. The traffic stops also resulted in three felony violation arrests.

Funding for additional traffic safety enforcement is provided by federal grant money distributed through the North Dakota Department of Transportation. High-visibility enforcement for traffic safety is one element of an allied effort to save lives by preventing motor vehicle deaths in North Dakota.

Motorists Urged to Use Caution in Work Zone and Plan Ahead

The North Dakota Department of Transportation's 2016 construction season is mid-way through with about 188 projects taking place across the state. Some of these projects may affect travel time and motorists are asked to plan ahead by looking at the travel map on the NDDOT website: (dot.nd.gov/travel-info-v2), using the NDRoads phone app or by calling 511 to find out about project locations as well as speed limits, vehicle width and length restrictions in some areas.

Road construction is essential as the transportation system needs to be maintained and enhanced to ensure safety for the traveling public. The NDDOT asks motorists to allow extra time to get to their destinations and use caution as well as courtesy while driving through work zones. Trying to arrive at a destination a minute or two sooner is not worth the risk. In a 10-mile work zone, it only takes 75 seconds longer to reduce your speed by 10mph.

"We know that delays occur during road construction season and want to thank everyone for their patience, but safety is important and a top priority on our highways," says Grant Levi, NDDOT Director. "When motorists travel through work zone, there is no room for error. Last year 155 crashes occurred in work zones resulting in one fatality as compared to 242 crashes and two fatalities in work zones in 2014. Drivers need to pay attention and minimize distractions."

As a reminder, if your travels lead you through a work zone, check the Travel Map for specific information about the following:

- You may experience traffic delays, and travel through a detour.
- Speeds are reduced through work areas.
- The number of driving lanes are often decreased.
- Width restrictions may be in place, if you are wider than the limit, you may need to adjust the route of your travels.
- Occasionally, length restrictions may be in place, such as in Carrington, where a new roundabout is being constructed.
- Flagger and pilot cars may be present, so be prepared to slow down and stop for them.
- At times workers will be present and could be working very close to the path of travel, please be courteous and slow down.
- Don't speed. Obey posted speed limits at all times, even when workers aren't present.
- Minimize distractions.
- Be patient. Work zones aren't present to inconvenience drivers, they're an important part in maintaining and rebuilding our state's infrastructure.
- Stay alert. Dedicate your full attention to the roadway.

What is Faith?



When in a conversation with someone that includes are relationship with God two words are commonly used~**faith and belief**. Let's look at their meaning and use scriptures to better understand their use. According to the online Miriam Webster Dictionary, a simple definition of **faith** is "a strong belief or trust in someone or something; belief in the existence of God; strong religious feelings or beliefs." Miriam-Webster's simple

definition of the word **belief** is "a feeling of being sure that someone or something exists or that something is true; a feeling that something is good, right, or valuable."

We can conclude with from these two definitions that we must first come to believe before we can have faith. It's not too hard to see how belief happens. First we must come to know about the thing or the person~and that means someone must inform us. Once we know we must get "a feeling" that it exists, that it is true, good, right or valuable. When we become sure then we believe. Let me give an example from my life. I have never been to Australia yet I believe it exists. I believe because I have learned about Australia in school, I have seen a map of Australia and I met people from Australia who have told me about their country. This information has given me a feeling of certainty that Australia exists, therefore, I believe.

Belief in God also begins this way. Families pass down to their children their experience of God. Others tell us about God. We read about God in Scriptures. When we finally reach a point of being sure and certain that God exists we can now say we have belief but we cannot say we have **faith**.

Let's now focus on the word **faith**. I ran across a simpler definition of faith in a Ministry Article entitled **The Difference Between Faith and Belief** by Chris Cree published November 8, 2015 on the NewCreations.org website that goes like this: "Faith=(Belief + Action+Confidence)." As discussed above, when we are sure and certain that God exists we have belief but in order to have faith we have to take action and have confidence in the God we believe exists.

Let's look at Abraham, known to be the **Father of Faith**. We can assume that Abram (the name given to him before God changed it to Abraham) came to believe in God through his family. We can see his belief become faith when he acted on what God asked, the second

element to **faith**: "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you" (Gen 12:1). God also told Abram "I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you and make your name great" (Gen 12:2). How many of us would launch out with our family to an unknown destination~"*the land that I will show you*"? This begins to show Abram's confidence in God, the third element of **faith**.

For the rest of Abram's life his faith continues to grow as he acts with confidence on what God asks him to do. Think about God's word to Abram that from him a great nation will arise. It wouldn't mean much if Abram and Sar'ai (his wife) were still young but when God promised Abram this "nation" through his descendants, Abram and Sar'ai were past the age of having children. Way past! When Abram questioned God how this will come about God lead him outside, it was during the day, and said to Abram "Look toward heaven, and number the stars, if you are able to number them...So shall your descendants be" (Gen 15:5). We can't see stars during the day yet Abram knew they were. God was strengthening Abram's faith by helping him grow in confidence and acting by waiting patiently.

When Sar'ai does conceive a son in her old age (Abram was 99 years old) God changed their names to Abraham and Sarah and named their son Isaac. Then God strengthened Abraham's faith once more. When Isaac was old enough to carry wood and go on a three day's journey God asked Abraham to sacrifice his son in "the land of Mori'ah...upon one of the mountains of which I shall tell you" (Gen22:2). Faith requires action~Abraham went as he was told. Faith also requires confidence. Note once again the phrase "of which I shall tell you." But more importantly, God promised Abraham descendants. Hear Abraham's confidence in God's promise in the words he says to the two young men that went with him and Isaac to the Land of Mori'ah: "Stay here with the donkey; I and the lad will go yonder and worship and come again to you" (Gen 22:5). Such confidence, he plans to come back with Isaac. A little later Isaac asks Abraham "Where is the lamb for the burnt offering?" And Abraham replies "God will provide himself the lamb for a burnt offering" (Gen 22:7-8). And before he sacrifices Isaac God stops him and Abraham spots "a ram caught in a thicket by his horns" (Gen 22:13). Abraham shows great confidence in God.

The title **Father of Faith** certainly describes Abraham. We too are to become models of faith in our walk with God and in our conversations with others. If we do not have such confidence in God, what's causing the doubt? If our belief in God doesn't lead us to action, what's causing our inaction?



Sadie Young Bear Mann, Midi he tah weish "Fasting Woman", 79, walked peacefully into the Spirit World from her home west of Mandaree, North Dakota on Friday morning, August 5, 2016.

Sadie Young Bear was born on April 9, 1937 at Elbowoods, to

Frank and Ruth (Standish) Young Bear. She was a member of the Waterbuster and a child of the Flint Knife clan. Sadie was devoted to helping people and she enjoyed her work at the Garrison Hospital.

She returned to New Town where she worked with the Tribe's Head Start Program. She also was one of the first skilled potters who created the well-known stoneware produced by Three Tribes Pottery and Stoneware.

She married Merrill Mann Sr., and they resided with their children in New Town. Early in her life, Sadie experienced a spiritual calling to follow a sacred and traditional path in life. Though she was guided by elder spiritual leaders, she was hesitant to become the first woman Sun Dance leader of the Northern Plains Sun Dance. Sadie fasted and sought spiritual guidance before she humbly accepted the gift of the sun dance and dedicated the rest of her life to fulfill the purpose for which she was called. As was foretold through her vision quest that people would gather from great distances and were brought from all four directions to share the gift of the sun dance led by Sadie Young Bear Mann.

Sadie provided spiritual healing, strength and direction to many who sought a traditional and sacred path to the Creator. She did not believe in taking short cuts and was obedient to the guidance she received.

She was known throughout Indian Country and traveled extensively when called upon to attend events and gatherings in various places across the United States. Sadie was deeply respected and revered by those whose lives she uplifted and changed through her spiritual healing, traditional teachings, and gifts from the Creator.

Sadie was devoted to her family; her son, her daughters and her grandchildren. She sewed many beautiful star quilts. She enjoyed pow wows, gardening, holiday gatherings, visiting friends and relatives at the Casino, and spending time out in the country. She will be deeply missed by her family, friends and relatives who knew her, loved her, and were blessed to have her in their lives. Sadie Young Bear Mann was the youngest of nine siblings and the last surviving daughter of Frank and Ruth Young Bear.

She is survived by her daughters; Yvette Young Bear, Natalie White Singer, Jennifer Mann, Ruthie Mann and son Merrill James Mann II, all of New Town.

Damon was a man who could adapt to any career challenge and mastered many trades. He worked various jobs such as the pipeline, casino, and in the customer service industry.


He was a humble person who cared deeply for his family. His co-workers often described him as a caring peaceful man.
